The WES is designed to explore a broad range of issues relating to employers and their employees. The survey aims to shed light on the relationship among competitiveness, innovation, technology use and human resource management on the employer side and technology use, training, job stability and earnings on the employee side. This is a longitudinal survey, so it tracks the same workplaces and their employees over a number of years. There are currently over 100 research projects either completed or underway using the WES.

2. Remote Access

The remote access service requires researchers to submit a proposal to Statistics Canada (wes-remote@statcan.ca) that is academic in nature (non-commercial) and uses multivariate methods. Statistics Canada will send a 'dummy data set' that allows researchers to write and debug analysis programs. Researchers can then submit syntax files for producing analytic results to wes-remote@statcan.ca). The researcher's syntax files are used to generate analytic results from the WES microdata files. The analytic results are screened for potential risk of disclosure, and only analytic results that are free of any potential risk of disclosing confidential information are returned to researchers. The remote access service is principally for the production of analytic model results. 3. The Research Data Centres Network

The Research Data Centres (RDC) program is part of an initiative by Statistics Canada, the <u>Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council</u> (SSHRC) and university consortia to help strengthen Canada's social research capacity and to support the policy research community.

RDCs provide researchers with access, in a secure university setting, to microdata from population and household surveys. The centres are staffed by Statistics Canada employees. They are operated under the provisions of the <u>Statistics Act</u> in accordance with all the confidentiality rules and are accessible only to researchers with approved projects who have been sworn in under the Statistics Act as 'deemed employees.'

RDCs are located throughout the country, so researchers do not need to travel to Ottawa to access Statistics Canada microdata.
