


#### Introduction and Summary

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

This document is intended to facilitate the consultation and manipulation of the Public Use Microdata File (PUMF) for the adult portion of the 2006 Participation and Activity Limitation Survey (PALS) conducted by Statistics Canada. The PALS data for children are not included in this file and will not be available as a PUMF for confidentiality reasons.

The PALS adult PUMF contains information on the survey objectives, methodology and estimation methods as well as the rules for disseminating estimates based on the survey data. This documentation will allow the researcher to use the PALS data correctly and should be read carefully due to the complex nature of the PALS survey data. Appendix A outlines the rules for obtaining the approximate variance. Appendix B contains the data dictionary. Appendix C presents the PUMF record layout.

# 1.1 Participation and Activity Limitation Survey 2006 — Summary of Concepts, Methodology and Data Quality

It's recommended to read this section to ensure that you have a good grasp of the basic concepts that define the PUMF data from PALS 2006, along with the underlying survey methodology and the main aspects of data quality. With this information, you will better understand the strengths and limitations of the data and how to analyse them properly. This information could be especially useful when making comparisons with data from other sources, or drawing conclusions. You will find additional details in the sections that follow.

#### 1.1.1 Data Sources and Methodology

PALS is a post-censal survey designed to collect information on adults and children with disabilities, those whose everyday activities are limited because of a condition or health problem.

Data collected by the survey are used to plan the services and programs required by persons with disabilities to participate fully in our society. The 2006 PALS was funded by Human Resources and Social Development Canada (HRSDC).

Disability survey data must be interpreted with caution. Comparisons between 2001 and 2006 PALS may be done but must be done carefully because there were some minor methodological changes made to the PALS sample design during that time.

Please see the 2006 PALS methodological report for more details. To facilitate comparisons between 2001 and 2006, the 2006 PALS PUMF includes only those records that may be compared to the 2001 PALS file and can thus be referred to as the 'historical' PALS 2006 population. It should be noted, however, that comparisons to existing 2006 PALS publications must also be made with caution as these publications used both the historical and actual 2006 PALS populations. Therefore, please ensure that the correct universes are being compared for all 2006 PALS data as well as 2001 and 2006 data.

It should also be noted that comparisons between the 2001 and 2006 PALS and the 1986 and 1991 HALS are not possible. The sample design and survey instruments are completely different and should not be compared. For more information regarding why PALS and HALS should not be compared, please see the 2001 PALS methodological report 'A New Approach to Disability' in Appendix A.

#### 1.2.1 Overall Methodology

The PALS adult survey population consisted of all persons 15 years of age or older living in households who reported at least one limitation to the Census questions on activity limitations and who were living in Canada at the time of the Census.

PALS is a voluntary survey. Interviews were conducted over the telephone by interviewers completing a computer-assisted questionnaire (CATI). This method improves accuracy by allowing interviewers to more easily move to the next appropriate question, within a complex format, based on answers provided by the respondent. Interviews by proxy were allowed.

A pilot test was conducted in the spring of 2006 to test the content of the questionnaires, in both official languages.

#### 1.2.1.i Reference Period

Data collection began October 30, 2006 and continued until February 28, 2007. The reference period varied depending on the question asked, e.g., the past week, the past six months, the past year or the past five years.

#### 1.2.1.ii Estimation

Estimation weights were adjusted by post-stratification to bring them into line with census-based population estimates for the strata and groups based on province, age and sex.

#### 1.2.2 Concepts and Variables Measured

To collect information on adults whose everyday activities are limited because of a condition or health problem, the PALS questionnaire identifies ten types of disabilities. However, for reasons of confidentiality related to the PUMF, four types of disabilities were grouped as "Other." As a result, the typology provided to PUMF users contains seven types of disabilities, namely hearing, seeing, speech, mobility, agility, pain and

"other" disabilities. The PALS 2006 Technical and Methodological Error! Bookmark not defined. report contains a description of this typology for adults.

For the degree of disability severity, PALS constructed a scale measuring the overall severity according to the intensity and frequency of the activity limitations reported by respondents. The disability severity scale for adults is divided into four levels: mild, moderate, severe and very severe. To increase the analytical usefulness of the PUMF, a second severity index was also developed for each of the seven types of disability identified in the PUMF. These indexes were developed using the same model as for the overall index, except that they contain only two levels of severity: least severe and most severe. The list of variables identifying each index is as follows:

For further information on the severity scale, see the PALS 2006 Technical and Methodological Report. The PUMF documentation includes an annotated list of all data elements included in the file, as well as a link to the complete questionnaire used for adult surveys. Section 3 of this documentation gives a detailed description of the content.

#### 1.2.3 Data Accuracy

The survey methodology was designed to control errors and reduce their potential effects. However, the results are still subject to sampling error and non-sampling error (that is, the difference between an estimate and the real value that is not due to sampling).

#### 1.2.3.i Sampling Error

Since the data are collected from a sample of individuals, they are subject to sampling error. In other words, estimates based on a sample vary from one sample to another, and usually they differ from the results that would have been obtained from a complete census.

#### 1.2.3.ii Non-sampling Error

Even estimates based on a census of the target population may contain errors. These are non-sampling errors, and estimates based on sample data may also contain them. Common sources of these errors are incomplete coverage, non-response, response errors and data processing errors.

#### 2. OBJECTIVES OF PALS

PALS is a post-censal national survey designed to collect information on adults and children with disabilities, that is, those whose everyday activities are limited because of a condition or health problem.

PALS provides essential information on:

- the prevalence of various disabilities
- support for persons with disabilities
- their employment profile
- their income and their participation in society

The data collected by PALS, combined with those from the Census, are an important source of information about specific characteristic traits of persons with disabilities. The PALS database can be used by all levels of government, associations, researchers and nongovernmental organizations to support the planning of services for persons with activity limitations to participate fully in society.

#### 3. CONTENT AND SPECIAL CHARACTERISTICS OF PALS

#### **Adult Survey**

As noted above, even though PALS 2006 and 2001 are successors to the 1986 and 1991 HALS, data from the two surveys cannot be compared owing to major differences in their sampling methods, the operational definition of their target population and the content of their questionnaires.

The adult questionnaire for PALS was developed based on a review of the 1991 Health and Activity Limitation Survey (HALS) questionnaires and input consultation with the client (HRSDC), the federal and provincial governments and community associations. It includes ten sections focusing on the different aspects of activity limitations, broken down as follows:

- Type of disability and severity
- Aids and assistive devices
- Employment history and training
- Education characteristics
- Main condition and cause
- · Care needed and received
- Local and long distance transportation
- Housing needs and modifications
- Internet use
- Social participation

#### 4. TARGET POPULATION AND SAMPLING DESIGN

PALS, a national survey, is termed post-censal because it uses the census as a sampling frame for identifying its target population.

#### 4.1 Target Population

The target population of PALS consists of individuals living in private households and some non-institutional collective dwellings who answered "yes" to either question 7 or 8 in the 2006 Census (form 2B), which identify persons with disabilities. However, the target population differed slightly in 2006 compared with 2001.

Previously, people living in the territories and aboriginal communities were not included. In 2001, Aboriginal communities were covered by the Aboriginal Peoples Survey (APS). In 2006, both those living in the territories and aboriginal communities were included in the PALS target population. There were also changes to the Census collective dwelling classification which allowed PALS to cover a greater number of collective dwellings.

For the PUMF, only the 'historical' population is used, which means the observations that are also part of the 2001 target population. It implies that the territories and that certain types of collective dwellings are not included.

#### 4.2 PALS Sampling Design

The PALS sampling plan can be considered as a two stage stratified design which used the 2006 Census long form sample. This long form contains two general filter questions on activity limitations and long-term disabilities. The 2006 PALS selected a sample of individuals from respondents on the Census long form who reported a positive response to at least one of these two filter questions. These respondents are said to be "individuals with disabilities" according to the Census. PALS uses, however, a more specific definition of disability and the PALS disabled population is a subset of the Census disabled population.

The sampling frame used for PALS consists of projections of the 2006 Census disabled population by age group and severity of disability within each Enumeration Area (EA). The strata are defined by the cross-classification of the ten provinces and three territories, four age groups and the Census severity of disability (defined by the response categories "Often" and "Sometimes"). Each Primary Sampling Unit (PSU) is made up geographically of one or more Census EAs and is defined within a severity and age group stratum. Although a given EA can be selected for more than one severity and age group combination, a PSU is defined in only one stratum. The PSU size comes from the projection of the Census disabled population for the combination of EA(s), age group and severity of the PSU.

At the first stage, PSUs are sampled using probability proportional-to-size (PPS) sampling. In the second stage of the sample design, all Census long-form respondents in a selected PSU are included in the 2006 PALS sample. The second stage sampling

design is therefore the one of the 2006 Census long form, which is in most EAs, a systematic sample of one in five households.

The original size of the PALS 2006 sample totalled 47,793 individuals, including 38,839 adults and 8,954 children, living in private households and collective dwellings. An overall response rate of 74.9% was obtained. For purposes of the PUMF file, analysis is based on the 26,431 persons aged 15 and over who responded to the survey and who are in the 'historical' PALS 2006 population. This included 20,725 adults who reported having at least one limitation in their activities at the time of the survey and 5,706 adults who reported being limited in their activities at the time of the census but indicated no limitation in PALS.

It should be noted that for analytical purposes, a stratified random sample of 131,010 individuals (107,400 adults and 23,610 children) were selected from the census frame, consisting of individuals who reported no disability or activity limitation in the census. The sample was allocated proportionally to the size of the population included in each stratum, thus producing a self-weighted sampling design. The strata used in the selection of this sample were formed by cross-classifying a geographic variable, an age-related variable and the sex variable. A portion of the adults thus selected and who are in the 'historical' population (89,707) were also included in the PUMF, partly to enable users to calculate disability rates and compare the population with and without disabilities for particular characteristics.

Due to confidentiality concerns and overlap with other Public Use Microdata Files (PUMF), 43,971 adults had to be removed from the PALS PUMF, leaving 72,167 adults for analysis (17,423 with disabilities and 54,744 without disabilities). Also for confidentiality reasons, the provinces can't be identified, which means that estimation using the PUMF may only be done at the Canada level.

#### 5. DATA COLLECTION

As noted above, PALS data were collected directly from respondents, from October 2006 to February 2007. Interviews were conducted by telephone, with interviewers completing a computer-assisted questionnaire. Interviews by proxy were allowed. Respondents were interviewed in the official language of their choice.

The interviews were conducted from centralized telephone facilities set up in four regional offices of Statistics Canada, in Halifax, Sturgeon Falls, Edmonton, and some cases were handled in Toronto. Calls were made between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m., from Monday to Saturday inclusively. Statistics Canada employees gave the interviewers training in survey concepts and procedures and interview methods.

#### 6. DATA PROCESSING

#### 6.1 Data Capture

Through the use of computer-assisted telephone interviewing (CATI), data capture occurs directly at the time of the interview.

#### 6.2 Coding

For questions for which it was possible to develop a written answer, responses were assigned either a code representing a new category or the code for a category listed on the questionnaire if the information fell into an existing category. Where applicable, responses were coded according to appropriate classification systems, namely ICD-10, NAICS 2002 or NOC-S 2001.

#### 6.3 Edit and Imputation

For PALS, the only type of imputation done was deterministic imputation. Once inconsistencies were identified between responses, a corrective action had to be used on at least one of the responses. The approach used to determine the appropriate action was generally the "bottom-up" approach. With this strategy, questions related to each other were edited simultaneously. If the answer to Question A determined that Question B was to be asked, then Question B was edited first and the edited responses to B were then used to determine if the response to Question A was correct. If both responses were inconsistent, the response to Question A was modified deterministically if possible. Conversely, for a small number of questions, a "top-down" approach was used. With this approach, responses to previous questions determined whether a subsequent question was to be asked. Although the corrections were generally done in an automated way, analysts reviewed some problem situations.

During this review, a valid response was deterministically imputed for the missing responses if sufficient information was available in the related questions. Otherwise, it was coded to "Not stated". In addition, the questions that were not to be asked were coded to "Not applicable". If a question with a missing answer (coded to "Not stated") should have been used to determine if subsequent questions were to be asked, these subsequent questions were set to "Path not known", because it was not possible to determine whether or not they should have been asked.

However, non-response was not permitted for the demographic information required for weighting, namely the age and sex of the respondent. This information was asked at the beginning of the interview to make sure the selected person had been reached. These two variables were imputed from the census if they were missing or invalid. In particular, an age was considered invalid if it was not consistent with the questionnaire used.

#### 6.4 Creation of Combined and Derived Variables

Some variables in the file were derived from information collected on the questionnaire. In some cases, derived variables are simple ones formed by grouping several categories. In other cases, two or more variables were combined to create a new one. The data dictionary specifies which variables are derived and how this was done.

#### 6.5 Level of Detail of the Microdata File

Most data from the PALS adult master file have been included on the Public Use Microdata File. The variables that have not been included were deemed to be confidential and would risk the identification of individual respondents. If these variables are required for analytical purposes users are encouraged to apply to the Research Data Centre (RDC) program where the full PALS master file may be analysed. A complete list of the variables provided in the PUMF can be found in the data dictionary (Appendix B).

#### 7. ESTIMATION

In a probabilistic sample such as the PALS sample, estimation is based on the principle that each person included in the sample represents not only him/herself but also a number of other persons who were not included in the sample. For example, in a simple random sample of 2% of the population, each person represents 50 members of the population (him/herself and 49 others). The number of persons represented by a given respondent is what is known as the respondent's weight or weighting factor.

A weighting factor is included in the PALS microdata file:

WEIGHT\_PUMF: This is the weight for analysis with respect to persons, that is, for calculating estimates of the number of <u>persons</u> (included in the target population) with one or more of specified characteristics. WEIGHT\_PUMF should be used to calculate all estimates. For example, to estimate the number of persons who are married or living in common-law unions, it is necessary to sum the WEIGHT\_PUMF values for all records that include this characteristic (MARSTHP=2).

#### 7.1 Weighting

As noted above, PALS 2006 is a survey of individuals, and the microdata file contains responses to the questionnaire and related information provided by 17,423 adult respondents with disabilities.

Calculating the weight for the survey file is a three-stage process. For the PUMF, a fourth stage was required:

#### 1) Calculating the initial weight

The first stage is the assignment of an initial weight based on the sampling design. The initial weight is the inverse of the probability of inclusion in the sample. For the 2006 PALS, the initial weight was the product of three components: the inverse of the sampling ratio of the Primary Sampling Unit (called the PSU weight), the census weight and the subsampling weight. Following this calculation, individuals selected by mistake and those missed during sample selection were taken into consideration and the appropriate weight adjustments were applied to the initial weight.

#### 2) Correction for non-response

The second stage of the weighting process is adjustment for non-response. More specifically, two adjustments were done at this stage to reflect the fact that non-respondents can be classified into two main categories with very different characteristics: the persons not contacted and the persons who were contacted but did not respond.

Weights were adjusted first for non-contact and then for non-response. Since the adjustment method was the same for the two types of non-respondents, it is described here for non-response only. The non-response was done by forming non-response adjustment classes in such a way that the records in each class had similar response probabilities. Estimated response probabilities were obtained by developing a logistic regression model to predict the response probability using explanatory variables.

Many explanatory variables can be used, since all census long form information is available for each respondent and non-respondent. Separate models were used for children and for adults. Approximately ten classes of roughly the same size were obtained for each logistic regression model. The inverse of the weighted response rate in a class was used as the weighting adjustment factor for that class, and the initial weights of the respondents within the class were adjusted accordingly.

#### 3) Post-stratification

The third stage of the weighting adjustment is post-stratification. This adjustment ensures that the sum of the final weights for the respondents is equal to the population counts obtained from the census. This adjustment is done for groups (called post-strata) defined by the combinations of geography, sex, age group (generally five-year age groups) and severity of the activity limitation(s) reported in the census. The weights corrected for non-response were then adjusted using the ratio of the census count to the sample count for each post-stratum. These final weights were used to produce all estimates for the different releases of PALS data.

#### 4) Weight adjustment for the PUMF

Since sub sampling was done for the PUMF, adjustments had to be done to the weights to account for the lost units. This way, we took into account the units that were removed due to overlap with other PUMFs and units with very small weights. To get these adjusted weights, the survey weights were multiplied by the subsampling weight. Then a new poststratification was needed in order to adjust to the known Census counts. Finally, some random noise was added to the resulting weight as an additional measure to ensure confidentiality.

#### 7.2 Weighting Guidelines

Users should not disseminate any unweighted total or perform analyses based on unweighted survey results. As explained in Section 7.1, several weight adjustments were made based on geography, stratum, age and sex. Sampling rates and non-response rates vary considerably from one stratum to another, and non-response rates also vary according to demographic characteristics. Clearly, unweighted sample

counts cannot be considered as representative of the population targeted by the survey.

#### 7.3 Types of Estimation

As noted above, a basic weight was assigned to each person sampled, and as described in Section 7.1, these weights were adjusted to reflect the age and gender composition of the Canadian population as estimated by Statistics Canada.

Using PALS data, two types of "simple" estimates can be calculated: qualitative estimates (estimates of numbers or proportions of persons with certain attributes or characteristics) and quantitative estimates (estimates of quantities or averages). Section 7.4 deals with more complex estimates and analyses.

#### 7.3.1 Qualitative Estimates

Qualitative estimates are estimates of the number or percentage of persons in the population targeted by the survey who have a certain characteristic or fall into a defined category. The values of these variables represent a quality rather than a quantity. An example of a qualitative estimate is the number or proportion of persons who reported "High school graduation certificate" as the highest level of schooling completed.

Qualitative estimates can be obtained by summing the final weights of all records that contain the characteristic(s) of interest. Proportions and ratios of the form  $\hat{Y}/\hat{W}$  are obtained by following the steps below:

- (i) sum the final weights of records containing the characteristic of interest  $\hat{\boldsymbol{Y}};$
- (ii) sum the final weights of records containing the characteristic of interest  $\hat{W}$ ;
- (iii) divide the result obtained in (i) by the result obtained in (ii), namely  $\hat{Y}/\hat{W}$ .

#### 7.3.2 Quantitative Estimates

Quantitative estimates are estimates of totals or means, medians or other measures of central tendency representing quantities. The number of weeks or hours worked is an example of a quantitative estimate.

This type of estimate can be obtained by multiplying the value of the variable of interest by the final weight of the corresponding record and summing this amount for all records selected.

To obtain a weighted average of the form  $\hat{Y}/\hat{W}$ , the numerator  $(\hat{Y})$  is calculated in the same way as a quantitative estimate and the denominator  $(\hat{W})$  in the same way as a qualitative estimate. For example, to estimate the average number of hours worked by respondents, proceed as follows:

- (i) estimate the total number of hours worked by respondents  $(\hat{Y})$  by multiplying the number of hours worked by each respondent by its corresponding final weight, then sum this value for all respondents;
- (ii) estimate the number of respondents (Ŵ) by summing the final weights for all records corresponding to a respondent;
- (iii) divide (i) by (ii), namely Ŷ/Ŵ.

#### 7.4 Guidelines for Analysis

As explained in detail in Section 4, PALS respondents do not constitute a simple random sample of the target population. The survey is based on a complex sampling design that calls for multi-stage stratification and sampling. Consequently, the selection of respondents was done according to unequal probabilities.

Survey weights must therefore be used in making estimates and analyses so that as much as possible, the over- or under-representation of age-sex groups in the unweighted file can be taken into consideration. The use of data from such a complex survey can pose problems for analysts, since the choice of methods of estimation and variance calculation depends on the sampling design and selection probabilities. A number of analysis methods integrated into statistical packages allow the use of weights, but the meaning and definition of these weights often differ from those that apply in the context of a sample survey. Therefore, while the estimates made using these packages are often accurate, the variances calculated are practically meaningless.

In many methods of analysis (such as linear regression, logistic regression, estimation of rates or proportions and analysis of variance), the application of current software packages can be made more meaningful by standardizing the weights that appear in the records so that the average weight is equal to 1. The results produced by traditional packages are thus more reasonable, because though they do not always reflect the stratification and clustering in the sampling design, they take account of selection with unequal probabilities. This standardizing can be done by dividing each weight by the overall average weight before proceeding to the analysis.

For an analysis of all respondents who are married or living in a common-law union, the procedure to follow is as follows:

- from the file, select all respondents who were living common-law (MARSTHP=2);
- calculate the average value of WEIGHT PUMF for all these records;
- for each of these respondents, calculate a "working" weight equal to WEIGHT\_PUMF /average weight;

- carry out the analysis for these respondents using the "working" weight.

Section 8 gives a more detailed description of sampling variability and data reliability.

#### 8. GUIDELINES ON DATA DISSEMINATION AND RELIABILITY

It is important for the user to become familiar with the content of this section before publishing or otherwise disseminating any estimate calculated using PALS microdata files.

This section of the document gives guidelines that users of the microdata file must follow. Users will thus be able to obtain figures which are consistent with those produced by Statistics Canada and which conform to established guidelines on rounding and dissemination. The guidelines fall into four major categories: minimum sample size for producing estimates; sampling variability; estimation of variance; and rounding.

#### 8.1 Minimum Sample Size for Producing Estimates

The user must determine the number of records in the microdata file that provided the data entering into the calculation of a particular estimate. If the number is less than or equal to 10, the weighted estimate must not be disseminated, regardless of its approximate coefficient of variation.

#### 8.2 Sampling Variability

Estimates drawn from the survey are based on a sample of individuals. Different figures might have been obtained if a complete census had been conducted using the same questionnaire, interviewers, supervisors, data processing methods, etc. The difference between an estimate produced from a sample and one produced from a complete enumeration conducted in similar conditions is called the sampling error of the estimate.

Errors unrelated to sampling can occur at almost any stage of a survey. Interviewers may misunderstand the instructions, respondents may make mistakes when answering questions, responses may be miskeyed into the computer or errors may occur when the data are processed or totalled. These are all examples of non-sampling errors.

If there are a large number of observations, random errors have little effect on estimates based on data from the survey. However, errors that occur systematically bias estimates. Much time and effort has been devoted to reducing non-sampling errors. At each stage of the data collection and processing cycle, quality assurance measures were applied in order to control data quality. These measures included using highly skilled interviewers, giving them intensive training in survey methods and the questionnaire, observing interviewers in order to detect problems caused by the questionnaire design or a failure to understand the instructions, adopting procedures to minimize data capture errors, and implementing coding controls and edits to confirm the processing logic.

#### 8.2.1 Non-sampling Errors

The effect of non-response on survey results is a major source of non-sampling error. Non-response may be either partial (not answering one or more questions) or total. There is total non-response when the interviewer is unable to locate the respondent or the respondent cannot provide the desired information (perhaps because of a language problem) or refuses to participate in the survey. Cases of total non-response are treated by correcting the weight applied to those persons who responded to the survey to compensate for those who did not.

In most cases, there was partial non-response to the survey where the respondent misunderstood or misinterpreted a question or was unable to remember the information requested. In PALS, no responses were imputed to compensate for partial non-response, and the question was assigned the response code "Not stated."

#### 8.2.2 Sampling Errors

Since estimates based on a sample survey inevitably contain sampling errors, good statistical methods require researchers to inform users of the magnitude of this type of error.

Although it is not possible to obtain an exact measure of the sampling error of an estimate as defined above using the sample data alone, it is possible to estimate a statistical measure of this error, namely the standard error, using these data. Based on the standard error, confidence intervals can be obtained for estimates (not taking the effects of non-sampling errors into account) on the assumption that the distribution of the estimates around the true value of the population is normal. In these conditions, the chances that the deviation between an estimate based on the sample and the true value for the population is less than one standard deviation are 68 in 100, while the chances that it is less than two standard deviations are approximately 95 in 100, and it is virtually certain that it is less than three standard deviations.

Since the absolute size of the sampling error of an estimate is often less important than its relative size (compared to the estimate itself), the standard error is not always the best measure of sampling error. For example, a standard error of 10 for an estimate of 20 would generally indicate that the quality of the estimate is poor, while the same standard error for an estimate of 1,000 would generally indicate that the estimate is good. Consequently, the size of the sampling error is often expressed in relation to the size of the estimate, in the form of a coefficient of variation (CV). The coefficient of variation of an estimate is obtained by dividing the standard error of the estimate by the estimate itself and expressing the resulting fraction as a percentage. In the above example, the CV of the first estimate is 50% (10/20), while that of the second is 1% (10/1,000).

#### **Guidelines for Dissemination of Estimates**

Before disseminating and/or publishing estimates based on the microdata file, the user should consult the table below and follow the guidelines corresponding to the value of the coefficient of variation of the estimate.

Type of estimate	Coefficient of variation	Guidelines for dissemination
Moderate sampling variability	0.0 % to 16.5%	You can consider general, unrestricted dissemination of the estimates. No particular annotation is required.
2. High sampling variability	16.6% to 33.3%	You can consider general, unrestricted dissemination of the estimates with a cautionary note concerning the high sampling variability associated with them.
3. Very high sampling variability	33.4% and over	The estimates should generally not be disseminated, but if they are, this should be done with great caution, with a clearly visible accompanying note stating that the sampling variability associated with them is very high.

Note: The sampling variability guidelines should be applied to rounded estimates.

#### 8.3 Variance Estimates

In the following description of estimation of variance, qualitative estimates and quantitative estimates are treated separately.

#### 8.3.1 Sampling Variability of Qualitative Estimates

Data variance for PALS was calculated using the bootstrap method. Bootstrap weights were calculated for each survey respondent. With variance calculation software such as SUDAAN, variance estimates can be obtained in the form of a coefficient of variation (CV) for various types of estimates in nearly any field. However, bootstrap weights cannot be provided to PUMF users for reasons of confidentiality.

For most users, it would be extremely costly and pointless to calculate the sampling variability of each qualitative estimate that can be drawn from the survey. Therefore, Statistics Canada has produced approximate measures of sampling variability in the form of a table of approximate CVs, so that users can have an idea of the quality of the results they produce with the PUMF.

First, a number of variables in the file were identified that would probably be used most often in analytical tables. Approximate CVs were produced for the domains obtained by

cross-tabulating these variables and are given for 11 different proportions (1%, 5%, 10%, 15%, 20%, 25%, 30%, 35%, 40%, 45% and 50%). Approximate CVs were calculated using bootstrap weights that had been adjusted for exclusion and undersampling.

In the form of an interactive EXCEL application, Statistics Canada provides a table of the approximate variance of estimates produced using WEIGHT\_PUMF for Canada. This informatics tool is provided free of charge to all PUMF users.

It should be noted that all coefficients of variation that appear in this table are approximate, and therefore they may not be considered official values. On a cost-recovery basis, Statistics Canada may produce estimates of the real variance for some variables. A decision to use the variance calculated for a specific variable instead of the approximate variance drawn from the tables could give the user more confidence in the quality of the estimates, especially those for which the coefficient of variation estimated according to the tables falls within the "very high sampling variability" range (see above for guidelines on the dissemination of estimates drawn from the survey).

#### 8.3.2 Sampling Variability of Quantitative Estimates

The use of approximate variances for quantitative variables cannot be summarized as easily. However, in general, the coefficient of variation of a quantitative total will be larger than that of the corresponding qualitative estimate (for example, the number of persons whose responses are used in producing the qualitative estimate). If the sampling variability of the qualitative estimate is high, that of the estimate of the quantitative total too will generally be high.

#### 8.4 Rounding

To ensure that estimates produced from PALS microdata files will correspond to those produced by Statistics Canada, the user is strongly advised to follow the rounding guidelines. Disseminating unrounded estimates could be misleading, since such estimates might appear to be more precise than they actually are.

#### 8.4.1 Rounding Guidelines

- 1) Estimates of totals that appear in the body of a statistical table should be rounded to the nearest ten by the traditional rounding method (see definition in Section 8.4.2).
- 2) Partial and grand totals in statistical tables should be calculated from their unrounded components, and then rounded to the nearest ten by the traditional rounding method.
- **3)** Averages, proportions, rates and percentages should be calculated from unrounded components, and then rounded to one decimal by the traditional rounding method.

- 4) Sums and differences of aggregates or ratios should be calculated from their corresponding unrounded components, and then rounded to the nearest ten or the nearest decimal using the traditional rounding method.
- **5)** Because of technical or other constraints, a rounding method other than traditional rounding may be used. In this case, the estimates obtained may differ from the corresponding estimates produced by Statistics Canada. If so, the user is strongly advised to state the reason for these differences in the document disseminated.

#### 8.4.2 Traditional Rounding Method

According to the traditional rounding method, if the first or only figure to be suppressed falls between 0 and 4, the last figure retained does not change. If the first or only figure to be suppressed falls between 5 and 9, the value of the last figure retained is increased by one unit (1). For example, the figure 8,499 rounded to the nearest thousand would be 8,000, while the figure 8,500 rounded to the nearest thousand would be 9,000.

#### **APPENDIX A**

## RULES FOR CALCULATING APPROXIMATE VARIANCE FOR THE 2006 PALS PUBLIC USE MICRO-DATA FILE

#### APPROXIMATE VARIANCE

Data variance for PALS was calculated using the bootstrap method. Bootstrap weights were calculated for each survey respondent. With a variance calculation software such as SUDAAN, precise variance estimates can be obtained in the form of a coefficient of variation (CV) for various types of estimates in nearly any domain.

However, these weights cannot be provided to public use microdata file (PUMF) users for reasons of confidentiality. Therefore, approximate CVs have been produced so that these users can have an idea of the quality of the results they will produce with the PUMF.

First, a number of variables in the file were identified that would probably be used most often to produce estimates. Approximate CVs were produced for every crossing of these variables, and will be available for 11 different proportions (see Table 1).

#### **QUALITY RULES**

The same quality rules that were applied for the different PALS data releases were applied here. Accordingly, when a cell contains 10 or fewer (unweighted) individuals, the cell is deleted. In these cases, zeroes replace the results in every "Results" column in the table. We also have a colour code for the estimated CVs:

Yellow	For CVs between 16.5% and 33.3%
Red	For CVs greater than 33.3%

The approximate CV table's different columns appear in tables 1 and 2.

#### • How is the CV of a proportion obtained?

1. Open the Excel sheet entitled <u>Tableaux de CV EPLA 2006 (FMGD) - CV Tables PALS 2006 (PUMF).xls</u>. The following columns will appear:

- 2. Click on the drop-down menu button in the "Groupe d'âge/Age group" column and select the age group for which you want the estimates. This action filters your data so that only those lines of the table that contain estimates for the specified age group are retained. If no age group is of interest, select "(All)" so they are all listed, or select "TOTAL" to retain only overall estimates for the population aged 15 and over.
- 3. Repeat the same procedure as in point 2 for the "Sexe/Sex", "Sévérité de l'incapacité/Severity of disab", "Type d'incapacité/Type of disability" and "Flag" columns.
- 4. Use the "Proportion" button to select the proportion you want. If you want to obtain a CV for a proportion that does not appear in the list, for example 23%, select "(All)" from the menu to retain all proportions. Thus, using the CVs that correspond to a proportion of 20% and 25% for the same domain will clearly yield the CV you want between these two limits.
- 5. The results are presented in the last six columns of the table (see Table 2).

This confidence interval is slightly different from the one in the Excel sheet due to rounding of the terms used in the manual calculations.

#### Note to users (interpolation):

It is important to remember that the coefficient of variation and the confidence interval limits are *approximate* values based on proportions that are as close as possible to the calculated proportions. To obtain more precise CV values, it may be useful to recalculate them by interpolation.

The percentage obtained in the previous example was 26.2%, and we selected the closest proportion, i.e. 25%. However, we could have used the following formula to obtain this CV:

$$CV(p) = CV(p^*) \sqrt{\frac{p^*}{1-p^*}} \sqrt{\frac{1-p}{p}}$$

where  $p^*$  is a proportion available in the CV tables, and p is the proportion for which a CV is being sought. If we use the proportions closest to the ones we are seeking, we get:

It is best to use the proportion that is closest to the one we want (25% in this example), but in this specific case, the results are similar.

The new confidence intervals at 95% can also be obtained by using the following formula:

$$p \pm 1,96 \times S \tan dard Error$$

where 
$$S \tan dard Error = \frac{CV \times Estimate}{100}$$

In example 1, the new 95% confidence interval would be:

$$0,159 \pm (1,96 \times 0,1583 \times 0,159) = [10,97\%;20,83\%]$$

Which means that the 95% confidence interval for the 15.9% proportion goes from 10.97% to 20.83%.

#### 2) Is the observed difference between the two proportions statistically different?

In the Excel sheet, the lower and upper limits of the 95% confidence interval for the proportions are provided. Thus, the method used to determine whether two proportions are statistically different is simple: if two confidence intervals overlap, we cannot confirm that the two proportions are different (or, in more technical terms, we cannot dismiss the null hypothesis whereby there is no statistical difference between the two proportions at the 95% confidence interval). Moreover, if the two confidence intervals do not overlap, it is possible to confirm that the two proportions are different.

TO FIND THE CV FOR THIS ESTIMATE, SIMPLY FOLLOW THE SAME STEPS AS IN EXAMPLE 1, THIS TIME SELECTING "FEMME/FEMALE" IN THE "SEXE/SEX" COLUMN, AND 25% IN THE "PROPORTION" COLUMN. THE CV IS 14.25% AND THE 95% CONFIDENCE INTERVAL FOR THIS PROPORTION IS BETWEEN 18.02% AND 31.98%, WHEREAS FOR MEN, IT IS BETWEEN 10.19% AND 19.81%.

GIVEN THAT THE TWO CONFIDENCE INTERVALS OVERLAP, WE CAN SAY THAT THE PROPORTIONS OF MEN AND WOMEN WITH A MODERATE HEARING LIMITATION WHO USE A HEARING AID ARE NOT STATISTICALLY DIFFERENT.

#### 3) How is the CV of a proportion greater than 50% obtained?

First, a brief reminder of the formula for calculating a coefficient of variation:

$$CV = \frac{S \tan dard \ Error}{Estimate} \times 100$$

The table gives us the CV and the estimate, which is a proportion. The bootstrap was used to estimate the standard error, which corresponds to the square root of the variance.

Let us assume that we are interested in a proportion greater than 50%. Although no CV has been calculated for proportions greater than 50%, the desired CV can be readily calculated using the complementary proportion as follows:

- we want the CV of proportion B that is greater than 50%
- we use the CV of the complementary proportion A, where A = 100 B
- for this work, the proportions A and B must be in a same domain
- thus:

$$CV_A = \frac{S \tan dard \ Error_A}{Estimate_A} \times 100$$

- we have to isolate the standard error in the formula and calculate the standard error based on the CV and the estimate in the table.

$$S \tan dard \ Error_A = \frac{CV_A \times Estimate_A}{100}$$

- since the **standard error for A is the same as for its complement B**, we can find the CV of B simply by using the original formula:

$$CV_B = \frac{S \tan dard \ Error_B}{Estimate_B} \times 100 = \frac{S \tan dard \ Error_A}{Estimate_B} \times 100$$

EXAMPLE 3: WE WANT TO DETERMINE THE PROPORTION OF WOMEN BETWEEN 50 AND 54 YEARS OF AGE WHO HAVE A MILD VISUAL LIMITATION. WE WANT TO KNOW WHAT PROPORTION OF THEM WEARS GLASSES OR CONTACT LENSES TO SEE UP CLOSE.

AN ANALYSIS OF THIS VARIABLE YIELDS THE FOLLOWING RESULTS:

WEARS GLASSES OR CONTACT LENSES TO SEE UP CLOSE	n	N	FREQ

TO FIND THE CV THAT IS ASSOCIATED WITH THE PROPORTION OF 82.7%, SIMPLY FOLLOW THESE STEPS:

- 1) OPEN THE FOLLOWING EXCEL SHEET:

- 2) SELECT "50-54" IN THE "GROUPE D'ÂGE/AGE GROUP" COLUMN

- 4) SELECT "1. LÉGER/MILD" IN THE "SÉVÉRITÉ DE L'INCAPACITÉ/SEVERITY OF DISAB"
- 5) SELECT "NSP" IN THE "TYPE D'INCAPACITÉ/TYPE OF DISABILITY" COLUMN
- 6) SELECT "NSP" IN THE "FLAG" COLUMN
- 7) IN THE "PROPORTION" COLUMN, SELECT THE PROPORTION THAT IS CLOSEST TO THE DESIRED ONE, I.E. 80%. BECAUSE THIS PROPORTION IS NOT AN OPTION, SELECT ITS COMPLEMENT INSTEAD, I.E. 20%.

8) CALCULATE THE CV:

$$CV_{80\%} = \frac{S \tan dard \ Error_{80\%}}{0.8} \times 100 = \frac{S \tan dard \ Error_{20\%}}{0.8} \times 100 = \frac{0.0508}{0.8} \times 100 = 6.35\%$$

# 4) How is the CV obtained when a part of the population has to be excluded from the proportion's calculation?

Some PALS questions were asked to only a subset of the population. For example, the question about whether the respondent sees well enough to read the newspaper with glasses or contact lenses was not asked to respondents who had just indicated that they could see well enough to read the newspaper without glasses or contact lenses. Thus, we sometimes find ourselves with a very large number of responses coded "not asked", and we may want to exclude these from the calculation of a proportion. In this case, we end up excluding a part of the population from the calculation of the proportion, and we have to take this into consideration when trying to get the CV for this proportion. See the following example.

EXAMPLE 4: WE WANT TO DETERMINE THE PROPORTION OF MEN BETWEEN 15 AND 19 YEARS OF AGE WHO HAVE A MILD LIMITATION. WE WANT TO FIND OUT WHAT PROPORTION OF THEM SEE WELL ENOUGH TO READ THE NEWSPAPER WITH GLASSES OR CONTACT LENSES (AHUI Q02).

THE ANSWER TO THIS QUESTION DEPENDS ON THE RESPONSE GIVEN TO QUESTION AHUI\_Q01 (CAN READ THE NEWSPAPER WELL WITHOUT GLASSES OR CONTACT LENSES). THE RESPONSES FOR THIS GROUP ARE AS FOLLOWS:

In this case, the population of interest includes men between 15 and 19 years of age with a mild limitation who answered question ahui\_Q02 (thus who have difficulty seeing well enough to read the newspaper without glasses or contact lenses). The Excel sheet will not yield the right cv associated with the proportion of 95.2% because there is no domain for this sub-population. If we had been interested in the proportion that includes the "not asked" responses, we could have used the Excel sheet and obtain 23.34%, but this is not the case here. Thus, we should instead apply the method that is explained in the following section because it refers to the calculation of proportions for domains that are not covered in the Excel sheet.

# 5) How do we estimate the CV when calculating proportions in domains that are not in the tables?

The CV tables were prepared for key domains, in this case the age, sex and degree of severity of the limitation groups. However, users may want CVs for domains that are not in the tables. Although they were not produced for other domains, the only way to estimate the CV is to look at the proportions and frequencies that are similar to those found by the user.


EXAMPLE 5: IN THIS CASE WE ARE INTERESTED IN THE PROPORTION OF WOMEN OVER 65 YEARS OF AGE WITH A VISUAL LIMITATION. WE WANT TO FIND OUT THE PROPORTION OF THESE WHO DO NOT WEAR GLASSES OR CONTACT LENSES TO SEE UP CLOSE.

THE AGE GROUP WE ARE LOOKING AT HERE IS A COMBINATION OF AGE GROUPS IN THE FILE (65-69, 70-74, 75-79, 80-84, 85+ <u>OR</u> 65-74, 75+). NO CV HAS BEEN CALCULATED FOR THIS AGE GROUP (65+). A VARIABLE ANALYSIS YIELDS THE FOLLOWING:

IN ORDER TO OBTAIN THE CV FOR THIS DOMAIN, WE CAN LOOK AT THE CVS OBTAINED FOR PROPORTIONS AND FREQUENCIES SIMILAR TO THE ONES THAT WE HAVE. FOR EXAMPLE, WE CAN LOOK AT THE CVS FOR DOMAINS WHERE THE FREQUENCIES FALL WITHIN THE INTERVAL [41,000; 43,000] WITH A PROPORTION BETWEEN 15% AND 20%.

AFTER SELECTING THE SEX, SEVERITY AND TYPE OF DISABILITY, WE CAN REQUEST THE OBSERVATIONS FOR WHICH N FALLS BETWEEN 41,000 AND 43,000 THROUGH THE AUTOMATIC FILTER:



The following observations are selected, and the CV corresponding to a proportion of approximately 18% is around 28%. Given that this CV is greater than 16.6%, the data should be used with caution.

The variable WEIGHT\_PUMF, called weight, gives the number of persons represented by each record. The weights of the individuals have been calculated based on the probability of selection and have been adjusted so that the PALS sample is representative of the population of interest. Because of those adjustments and because certain individuals had unequal probabilities of selection, the weights might vary significantly from one person to another. The weight must therefore be used for all estimates and analyses that are based on the PUMF otherwise the results will be biased.
