INTRODUCTION

This is the fifth in a series of microdata tapes from Statistics Canada's Survey of Consumer Finances which contain income as well as personal and labour-related characteristics of individuals aged 15 and over. A limited number of characteristics of the individual's economic and census families are also included on the tape.

The universe on this tape is all individuals aged 15 and over. This is a broader universe than the published one (Catalogue No. 13-207) which is restricted to income recipients whose major source of income was not military pay and allowances. The variable "Publication Indicator" has been added to the file to identify these additional individuals. The variable "Presence of Earnings/Other Income" has been included on the tape to assist users in identifying the published sample of (a) income recipients (codes 1 and 2) (b) earners (code 1).

Users of this tape should be aware of the following points:

1. All distributions, estimated numbers and amounts, averages, etc. must be produced using weighted values and not sample counts. For a description of the weighting factor and its use see the item description "Final Universal Weight" and "Sample Design and Implications" in this documentation.
2. Any estimates or percentage distributions to be published or analysed from this data set should be based on a sample of at least 100 records. This is the policy followed in our publications and is based on the fact that data produced from smaller samples is unlikely to be reliable. The purchaser of this tape is invited to submit his final manuscript(s) to the manuscript review service offered by the Division. For further information on this procedure see "Procedures for Manuscript Review" of this documentation. In the text of such manuscripts the source should be described as follows: "The analysis done for this report is based on the Statistics Canada microdata tape "Individuals aged 15 and over, with and without income in 1986" which contains data collected in the 1987 Survey of Consumer Finances. All computations on this data base were done by (name of user organisation)." If this is the only source of data in the report, it is not necessary to source each table as well. However, if there are other sources, the tables should be individually sourced. In accordance with the development of standard referencing for machine-readable data files¹, we recommend the following wording be used in bibliographies:

3. The term "reference year" refers to 1986 wherever it appears in this documentation.
4. The term "survey year" refers to 1987 wherever it appears in this documentation.
5. The term "reference week" refers to the week of April 13 to 18, 1987, the week immediately preceding the two-week period when the Survey of Consumer Finances was conducted.

A considerable effort has been made to correct inconsistencies in the data. However, unusual situations or inconsistencies may still be present. Some of these are described in the relevant pages of the tape documentation and users are therefore advised to read over the documentation to be aware of these cases. In order to improve future issues of this data set we would appreciate hearing from users regarding any problems, suggestions or comments on the tape contents or documentation.

NOTES FOR USERS OF HISTORICAL SERIES OF SCF TAPES

1. On microdata files prior to the 1984 income file (1985 Survey of Consumer Finances), individuals with exceptionally high incomes, large income losses from self-employment or unusual characteristics were excluded from the file. Beginning with the 1984 income file records with these conditions have had selected characteristics zeroed-out rather than removing these records from the file. Variables which have been masked have been indicated on the record layout as "Special Individual". Control counts in the last pages of this documentation include these records.
2. The Classification of Occupations based on the 1980 Standard Occupational Classification was used for the first time on the 1984 income file.
3. Beginning with the 1984 income file, the size of area variable (position 8) is based on 1981 Census population counts within 1981 boundaries. Microdata files prior to the 1984 income file were based on 1976 populations within 1971 boundaries. The procedure of recording unique centres was somewhat revised beginning with the 1984 income file to provide less distortion in size of area groupings (see "Area").
4. Beginning with the 1985 income file, all dollar fields have been increased from 7 to 8 bytes.
5. Beginning with the 1986 income file, individuals with major source of income "Military Pay and Allowances" have been included. Prior to the 1986 income file, they were excluded. For these individuals the variable "Publication Indicator" is 0.
6. From a methodological point of view, 2 important changes have occurred:
 - (i) The sample design changed with the 1984 income file from that described in Catalogue No. 71-526, Methodology of the Canadian Labour Force Survey to the revised design described in the feature article published in The Labour Force, January 1985, Catalogue No. 71-001.
 - (ii) Beginning with the 1977 income file, imputation of income data to income non-respondents has been incorporated into the survey processing. For more information, see "Collection and Processing Procedures" of this documentation.

* These variables require some explanation. Following historical procedures, Family and Youth Allowances are reported in the SCF by the person claiming the children for a tax exemption, usually the male parent; although in most cases the monthly cheque is payable to the female parent. This procedure has been followed to avoid having a large number of income recipients whose only source of income is Family Allowances. Similarly, the Child Tax Credit, although usually received by the wife, is reported by the father if the wife has no other sources of income. We are providing these values at the census family level on the census family head's and wife's records so that these values can be substituted for the amounts at the individual level in "Family and Youth Allowances" and "Child Tax Credit" if the user prefers to show these payments as the wife's. For additional details and a description of some unusual situations remaining on the data tape see "Sources of Individual's Income - Family and Youth Allowances and Child Tax Credit".

AREA

Description

This variable indicates the population size of the area in which the surveyed unit is located. Population figures used to classify this variable were obtained from the 1981 Census and apply to the population covered by the Labour Force Survey within 1981 Census boundaries to conform with the sample design.

In five cases where urban centres are unique in a given area category for their province, they have been placed in another category. Two centres, Halifax and Saint John, have been moved down one category. St. John's, which was unique in the next lower category, was moved down two categories and Victoria was moved up one category. Brandon was moved up two categories.

AREA

The reweighting exercise was based on updated population counts from the 1986 Census. (Original weights were based on projections from 1981 Census population counts).

With the availability of 1986 Census population counts, the "Area" variable was also updated, based on 1986 population within 1981 boundaries. (Original area was based on 1981 population within 1981 boundaries).

The area change affected two cities: Moncton and Kingston both moved from size "3" to size "2". Since low income status is determined by the size of family and size of area, some records had their low income status affected by this change, moving from above the cut-off to below the cut-off. The number of records affected is small, consisting of just those with incomes between the cut-offs for size of area "3" and "2".

Since updating the "area" code for Moncton and Kingston records would permit identification of these cities, the "area" code on the microdata file has not been changed from the original value. However, revised low income status code has been included on the file, so that users may reproduce revised published estimates. (see position 331, and pages and 39A).

FINAL UNIVERSAL WEIGHT

Description

This is a three-digit variable which is computed to provide weights to inflate the sample to pre-determined population totals. It is actually 10% of the true weight so any aggregate calculated should be multiplied by 10. This weight must be used to produce valid statistics from this tape.

However, all estimated numbers and aggregates obtained from this survey should be treated as only approximate. As an illustration see the Reconciliation of SCF Income aggregates to National Accounts aggregates of this documentation. The reliability of the survey's estimates depends in part on the quality of independent population estimates used to determine the weights. (Sampling errors are another factor in determining data quality. For further information see "Collection and Processing Procedures" in this documentation and Catalogue No. 13-207.) The survey has to use estimates which are available at the time when the survey is processed. Frequently only preliminary figures are available then. Better estimates become available later but, due to the time lag and for other reasons, the survey is not re-weighted.

For information on the principle behind weighting and on the actual calculation of these weights see Catalogue No. 13-207.

For information on the sample design see the feature article in The Labour Force, January 1985, Catalogue No. 71-001.

INDIVIDUALS AGED 15 AND OVER, WITH AND WITHOUT INCOME, 1986 INCOME

REVISED WEIGHTS

SPECIAL NOTE TO USERS: REVISED WEIGHTS (1986 INCOME)

This microdata file contains a revised weight ("Revised Universal Weight") in positions 326-330. The revised weight comes from a new weighting procedure based on updated population counts from the 1991 census. This weight replaces the original weight ("Final Universal Weight") in position 10-12.

The revised weight is a 100% value while the original weight was a 10% value. The variable description on page 1 for the weight, stating that "...any aggregate calculated (from the file) should be multiplied by 10..." does not apply to the new weight, ie., the new weight should be used directly, without multiplying by 10.

The "SCF Income Estimates" on page 119 to 123 are included in this documentation package to permit users to verify their analytical/tabulation programs used with this file. The "sample count" values are simple counts of the file sample records and are not affected by the revised weights. The "weighted counts"/"Total weighted values", however, are derived from the revised weights in positions 326-330. Therefore, any weighted counts calculated from the file should use the original weight for reconciliation purposes. All final analysis and tabulations, though, should use the revised weight.

WAGES AND SALARIES

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported as wages and salaries from civilian employment.

Included are gross cash wages and salaries received during the reference year from all jobs, before deductions for pension funds, hospital insurance, income taxes, Canada Savings Bonds, etc. Tips of such employees as waiters and porters, earnings of farm labourers, cleaning women, newspaper boys and baby-sitters as well as net commissions (gross commissions less expenses) of a salesperson who worked for only one company at a time and did not pay for his/her own office and staff are included here.

The value of taxable allowances and benefits provided by the employers, such as free lodging, bursaries, travelling expenses, etc. are not included.

The wages and salaries reported should amount to the "total earnings before deductions" as shown in Box C of the T4 slips less the value of "taxable allowances and benefits" shown in box K to O plus tips and gratuities and casual earnings for which no T-4 slips were provided.

This variable is given separately on the tape for each individual and his/her family.

This variable is always positive.

MILITARY PAY AND ALLOWANCES

Description This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals on account of service as a regular member of the Armed Forces of Canada or as a member of a reserve unit, as well as payment to dependents of such servicemen. Special benefits paid upon discharge are also included.

This variable is always positive.

NET INCOME FROM NON-FARM SELF-EMPLOYMENT

Description This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals on account of various types of non-farm self-employment activities.

Self-employment income is defined as that income received as a result of being a partner in, or sole owner of, an unincorporated business or professional practice. Only the individual's share of net income is included in the case of partnerships. A salesperson who has his/her own office or staff, or who works for more than one firm at a time, reports income under self-employment. Net income is calculated by deducting operating expenses (wages, rent, interest payments, etc.) and depreciation costs from the gross revenue of the business. Items of a capital nature (e.g. investment in new buildings) are excluded from expenses.

Income received from businesses which have corporate status is reported as wages and salaries or as dividends (under investment income).

This variable may be positive, indicating a business profit, or negative, indicating a loss.

NET INCOME FROM FARM SELF-EMPLOYMENT

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals on account of net income from farm self-employment.

Net income from farming is calculated by deduction operating expenses (wages, rent, interest payments, etc.) and depreciation costs from the gross revenue of the farm. Items of a capital nature (e.g. investment in new buildings) are excluded from expenses. Government supplementary payments are included in gross revenue. The value of income in kind is not included. In the case of partnerships, only the individual's share of net income is included.

Income from farms which have a corporate status is recorded as wages and salaries or dividends, not self-employment income.

This variable may be positive, indicating profits, or negative, indicating losses.

NET INCOME FROM ROOMERS AND BOARDERS

Description This variable gives the sum of net income from roomers and boarders calculated for all individuals reporting gross income from roomers and boarders. Net income is calculated during data processing as one third of the gross amount reported. Payments of room and board from relatives are not included.

This variable is always positive.

TOTAL NET INCOME FROM SELF-EMPLOYMENT

Description

This variables gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals on account of net income from self-employment (both farm and non-farm) and net income from roomers and boarders. It equals the sum of the three previous variables.

This variable may be positive, indicating a profit, or negative, indicating a loss.

TOTAL EARNINGS

Description This variable gives the sum of amounts reported on account of wages and salaries, military pay and allowances, net income from both farm and non-farm self-employment and net income from roomers and boarders.

This variable may be positive or negative.

TOTAL INCOME FROM INVESTMENT

Description This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by the individual on account of investment income.

This source of income includes interest received on bonds, deposits and savings certificates from Canadian or foreign sources, dividends received from Canadian and foreign corporate stocks, cash dividends received from insurance policies, net rental income from real estate and farms, interest received on loans and mortgages, regular income from an estate or trust fund and other investment income.

This variable may be positive or negative.

Note for the 1986 data tape:

Any cash bonuses relating to Canada Savings Bonds which were received in 1986 and were reported as interest income on the Individual Income Tax Return Form T1 are included in Total Income from Investment.

Canada Savings Bonds, Series S32 and S34, matured on November 1, 1986. The amount of accrued interest received during 1986 as shown on the Ownership Certificate (T600) should be included here but not the principal.

FAMILY AND YOUTH ALLOWANCES

Description

This variable gives the amount received by the individual on account of Federal and Provincial family and youth allowances. The Provincial programme included is for Quebec.

The amount of family and youth allowances received is reported by the person who claimed a personal tax exemption for the child(ren) for whom the allowance was paid. Usually, this is the higher income parent. Tape users who would prefer to have these amounts on the female parents' records (or the male parents' records) in all cases should refer to "Census Family - Family and Youth Allowances" in this documentation. If neither parent (or guardian) claimed an exemption for the child(ren), the person to whom the cheque was made out was to report the payments. This reporting procedure has been used since the survey of 1975 incomes. Prior to that, the male parent or guardian reported the family allowance benefits.

This variable is always positive.

CHILD TAX CREDIT

Description

This variable gives the amount of the Child Tax Credit as claimed on the T1 Schedule 10 (if a Child Tax Credit Prepayment was received) or on the T1-General or on the T1-Special Individual Income Tax Return (if a Prepayment was not received). This amount was to be reported on the survey questionnaire by the person who received the Family Allowance payment as of December of the reference year (usually the female parent). If tax credits were this person's only source of income, the amount was transferred to the spouse. (Family Allowance payments, however, are reported by the person who claimed the children for a tax deduction.)

It should be noted that the tax credit amount reported is for the taxation year (reference year). This amount may have been received in cash (in the survey year as well as during the reference year for any Prepayment amounts) or may have only resulted in a reduction in total income tax payable.

This variable is always positive.

OLD AGE SECURITY, GUARANTEED INCOME SUPPLEMENT AND SPOUSE'S ALLOWANCE

Description

This variable gives the amount received by all individuals 65 years of age and over on account of Old Age Security Pensions and the Guaranteed Income Supplement as well as amounts of spouses' allowances received by eligible spouses age 60-65. Supplements from provincial governments are included in Social Assistance and Provincial Income Supplements.

This variable is always positive.

CANADA/QUEBEC PENSION PLAN BENEFITS

Description

This variable gives the amount reported by the individual as benefits received under the Canada/Quebec Pension Plans.

This includes retirement pensions, survivor's benefits such as widow's pensions, disabled widower's pensions, orphan's benefits, and disability pensions with benefits for dependent children of disability pensioners. Lump sum death benefits received under these plans are not included.

This variable is always positive.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (UIC) BENEFITS

Description

This variable gives the sum of the amounts reported by the individual on account of the Unemployment Insurance scheme. This should equal the amount from the Box entitled, "Total Benefits" of the T-4U Income Tax slip and includes benefits for sickness, maternity, work-sharing, retraining and retirement. Benefits paid to self-employed fishermen are also included.

This variable is always positive.

SOCIAL ASSISTANCE AND PROVINCIAL INCOME SUPPLEMENTS

Description

This variable gives the amount reported by the individual as received for social assistance from Provincial or Municipal governments. Also included are payments received from provincial income supplement programs.

Benefits include assistance to needy mothers with dependent children, to the blind and disabled as well as other cash payments to any persons in need.

This variable is always positive.

OTHER INCOME FROM GOVERNMENT SOURCES
(INCLUDING PROVINCIAL TAX CREDITS)

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by the individual on account of all other payments received from federal, provincial or municipal governments not reported in previous variable fields. As of 1981 it also includes provincial tax credits as claimed on Individual Income Tax Return Forms.

Examples of payments included are veteran's pensions, pensions to widows and dependents of veterans, civilian war allowances, worker's compensation, payments received from Employment and Immigration Canada for training programs administered under the National Training Program, Quebec Work Assistance programs, Quebec Maternity Allowance, regular payments received from provincial automobile insurance plans and provincial grants for home ownership promotion, mortgage interest rate reduction and property improvement.

Provincial tax credits included are the amounts claimed on the Individual Income Tax Returns under "Summary of Tax and Credits" for Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta (including also "Royalty Tax Credit") and British Columbia. Quebec's Real Estate Tax Refund as claimed on forms TP1AV or TP1GV and Quebec Allowance for Children Under 6 years of age are also included. These amounts may have been received in cash (probably during survey year) or may have resulted in a reduction in total income tax payable.

This variable is always positive.

TOTAL GOVERNMENT TRANSFER PAYMENTS

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts received on account of Family and Youth Allowances, Old Age Security pensions and Guaranteed Income Supplement, Canada/Quebec Pension Plan benefits, Unemployment Insurance, Child Tax Credit and Provincial Tax Credits, social assistance and other government transfer payments. It equals the sum of the seven variables preceding it on the record layout.

This variable will always be positive.

TAXABLE GOVERNMENT TRANSFER PAYMENTS

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported as receipts from government transfer programs which are taxable. This amount is calculated during the survey processing, not reported by individuals as the amounts reported on their Individual Tax Returns. This variable should be used with this in mind and any reports or publications derived from this tape using this variable should mention our reservations about its use. The following amounts were included:

1. Family and Youth Allowances - all amounts;
2. Basic Old Age Security (OAS) - Amounts reported as OAS-GIS could be separated into two components only by assuming that all amounts, up to and including a value equal to the basic OAS maximum for reference year, were OAS for each recipient;
3. Canada/Quebec Pension Plan Benefits - all amounts;
4. Unemployment Insurance Benefits - all amounts;
5. Any other income from government sources - Respondents were requested to specify the source of these payments.

This variable is always positive.

NON-TAXABLE GOVERNMENT TRANSFER PAYMENTS

<u>Description</u>	
	Non-taxable transfers are also calculated during the survey processing and are subject to the same types of errors as taxable transfers. The following amounts are included:
	1. Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) - Amounts reported as OAS/GIS by any individual which are in excess of the basic OAS maximum value are assumed to be GIS and therefore non-taxable. This is not a strictly accurate procedure as payments received only part of the year may total less than the basic OAS maximum value but may, in fact, include GIS amounts.
	2. Social Assistance and Provincial Income Supplements - all amounts.
	3. Other Income from Government Sources - Respondents were asked to specify the source of these payments. The following sources were non-taxable: (a) Veteran's pensions, (b) Pensions to widows and dependents of veterans, (c) Workers' Compensation, (d) Naval Pension, (e) Automobile Insurance Board of Quebec.

RETIREMENT PENSIONS, SUPERANNUATION AND ANNUITIES

Description

This variable gives the amount reported by the individual as the result of having been a member of a pension plan of one or more employers, except for pensions received from abroad which are included in Other Money Income (see next page).

Widows or other relatives of a deceased pensioner, who have pension rights under a pension plan or who become beneficiaries in cases guaranteed for a minimum period even if the pensioner dies, include this pension income here (unless it falls under the Canada or Quebec Pension Plan benefits). Also included are pensions of retired R.C.M.P. officers, army personnel and civil servants, and annuity payments received from Canadian Government Annuities Fund, an insurance company or other sources whether or not it was this person who purchased the annuity originally. Pensions received from registered retirement savings plans in the form of a life annuity, a fixed term annuity, a registered retirement investment fund or an income-averaging annuity contract are also included.

Refunds of pension fund contributions because an employee has resigned, are not considered income, and therefore, are not included. Withdrawals from a pension plan or RRSP, or refunds of over contributions as well as all lump sum benefits are not included. Severance pay is reported in "Other Money Income".

This variable is always positive.

OTHER MONEY INCOME

Description This variable gives the amount reported by the individual on account of other money income not included in the previous variables.

Included in this amount are:

- (a) Money received for the care of children being cared for on behalf of the Children's Aid Society.
- (b) Income received from abroad in Canadian dollar equivalent, including pensions, severance pay and retirement allowances, but not including interest and dividends.
- (c) Non-refundable scholarships and bursaries.
- (d) Alimony.
- (e) Royalties on books, oil wells, etc.
- (f) Strike and sick pay from trade unions.
- (g) Payments from an income maintenance insurance plan or a guaranteed annual wage plan.

Excluded are:

- (a) Gambling gains and losses.
- (b) Money inherited during the year in a lump sum.
- (c) Capital gains or losses.
- (d) Receipts from the sale of property or personal belongings.
- (e) Income tax refunds.
- (f) Loans repaid to the respondent as lender.
- (g) Loans received.
- (h) Lump sum settlements of insurance policies.
- (i) Rebates received on property taxes or other taxes.
- (j) Refunds of pension contributions.
- (k) Income in kind.
- (l) Lump sum withdrawals from a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP).

This variable is always positive.

TOTAL INCOME

Description This variable is the sum of receipts from the sources described on previous pages of this documentation and is equal to the sum of the following income items: Total Earnings, Total Income from Investment, Total Government Transfer Payments, Retirement Pensions, Superannuation and Annuities and Other Money Income.

This variable may be positive, negative or zero.

ECONOMIC FAMILY

LOW INCOME CODE (1978 BASE)

Description

This code indicates whether or not the family unit falls below the 1978 base low income cut-off. These cut-offs were determined by adjusting the low income lines developed after analysis of 1978 Family Expenditure data for increasing prices, as reflected in the Consumer Price Index. These 1978 base low income limits reflect more recent consumption patterns of Canadian families. As the overall ratio spent on food, shelter and clothing had declined since 1969, families who on average spent 58.5% or more of their income on this type of goods and services were considered to be in straitened circumstances.

LOW INCOME CODE (1978 BASE)

With reweighting, the "Area" variable was updated to reflect 1986 population within 1981 boundaries.

The area change affected two cities: Moncton and Kingston both moved from size "3" to size "2". Since low income status is determined by the size of family and size of area, some records had their low income status affected by this change, moving from above the cut-off to below the cut-off. The number of records affected is small, consisting of just those with incomes between the cut-offs for size of area "3" and "2".

Revised low income status code has been included on the file, so that users may reproduce revised published estimates. (see position 331).

This variable gives the housing status of the economic family at the time of the Labour Force Survey in April, of the survey year.

This coding is derived from a question which only asks if the dwelling is owned by a member of the household. If the dwelling is owned by a household member, it is assumed that it is owned by the first economic family listed on the questionnaire. Secondary economic families are always code 4, which could mean rent-free accommodation, roomers, lodgers, employees or other miscellaneous arrangements. Dwellings owned or rented in partnership by two or more economic families are not identified so the secondary economic family is always coded "Other".

A dwelling is considered "owned" whether or not it has been fully paid for. Dwellings in multiple dwelling structures (e.g. apartment buildings) which are owned under a co-ownership arrangement are also coded "owned". People living in condominiums which are not yet registered are not coded as owners.

SPOUSE'S TOTAL INCOME SUBJECT TO TAX

Description

For individuals who are heads or wives in a census family this variable indicates the amount of their spouse's income which is subject to income tax: (i.e. on the head's record this will be his wife's amount, if a wife is present; on the wife's record this will be the husband's amount) the census family relationship code identifies whether this is a head or wife. - Taxable Other Money Income

This variable may be either positive or negative.

CENSUS FAMILY

FAMILY AND YOUTH ALLOWANCES

Description

This variable indicates the total payments received by the census family under the federal and provincial (Quebec and Alberta) programs. In almost all cases, these payments are reported by only one person in the family, either the head or wife whichever person claimed a personal tax exemption for the child(ren) in respect of whom the allowance was paid.

Tape users who would prefer to consider these payments as either the wife's (or the husband's) income in all cases may do so by using this amount instead of the value in Sources of Individual's Income - Family and Youth Allowances.

Users should realize that other variables may also require adjustment (e.g. Total Government Transfers, Total Income, Major Source of Income, Proportion Contributed to Family Income, etc.).

In census families both the head and wife may have reported Family Allowances.

CENSUS FAMILY

CHILD TAX CREDIT

Description This variable gives the amount of the Child Tax Credit received by this person's census family. In most cases, this person is the head or wife.

Tape users who would prefer to consider these payments as either the wife's (or the husband's) income in all cases may do so by using this amount instead of the value in Sources of Individual's Income - Child Tax Credit. Users should realize that other variables may also require adjustment (e.g. Total Government Transfers, Total Income, Major Source of Income, Proportion Contributed to Family Income, etc.).

RELATIONSHIP TO HEAD OF CENSUS FAMILY

Description

For purposes of using the data in the preceding 5 variables which are given only on records of census family heads and wives, this variable identifies these heads and wives.

A census family consists of either a husband and wife (with or without children who have never married) or one parent with one or more children (who have never married), who are living together in the same dwelling. Once a son or daughter marries, he or she ceases to be a member of the parents' census family even if continuing to live under the same roof. A child who is living under the care of persons other than its own parents is considered a guardianship child (e.g. a grandchild not living with parents but with grandparents) and is a member of their census family. Foster children and wards of Children's Aid Society are treated as guardianship children. A guardianship child must be under 21 and not have married.

A person who is living alone, with unrelated individuals (as a lodger, employee or partner), or living with relatives but not in a husband-wife or parent-child relationship is a person not in family. If related to the household head, he (or she) may be a widowed parent, a sister or brother, aunt or uncle, a child who has been married and is living with parent or parents or another relative of the head of household.

The head of the census family is always the husband or parent. The head of a one-person census family is the person himself. The head must always be 15 years of age or over. Therefore, in rare cases where a person under 15 lives with non-relatives, this person is classified as a guardianship child in their census family.

Under Labour Force Survey procedures, members of the household are divided into economic families at the time of the interview. The method of selection of the head of each economic family is described on following pages.

During the processing, census families are derived from the economic families according to the individual relationships to the head of each economic family. For the **Survey of Consumer Finances**, in cases of married couples where the female is coded head and the male is coded spouse, the relationships are switched so that, for historical comparability, males will always be heads in married couple situations. This relationship switch is not done for Labour Force Survey statistics.

RELATIONSHIP TO HEAD OF ECONOMIC FAMILY

Description

An economic family is defined as a group of individuals sharing a common dwelling unit who are related by blood, marriage or adoption. A person living alone or rooming in a household where he is not related to any other household members is called an "unattached individual" and is treated as an economic family unit by himself.

Under Revised Labour Force Survey procedures, members of the household are divided into economic families at the time of the interview. The head of each family is selected by the person interviewed with only the following restrictions:

If...

Then...

A family group consists of parent(s) and "single" children...

...The respondent selects either one of the parents as the head of the family
(or if the respondent is unable or unwilling):
...one of the parents is selected by the interviewer; whoever is the one mainly responsible for the maintenance of the family

A family group consisting of parent(s) and married, widowed, divorced or separated son/daughter or son/daughter-in-law...

...The respondent selects either one of the parents or the son/daughter or son/daughter-in-law
(or if the respondent is unable or unwilling):

A family consists of brothers and/or sisters, and/or other group of related persons...

...The respondent selects one person as the head of the family
(or if the respondent is unable or unwilling):
...the head of the family is selected by the interviewer as whoever is either the eldest or the one mainly responsible for the maintenance of the family

RELATIONSHIP TO HEAD OF ECONOMIC FAMILY - [Concluded]

During processing of the **Survey of Consumer Finances**, in cases of married couples where the female is coded head and the male is coded spouse, the relationships are switched so that, for historical comparability, males will always be heads in married couple situations. This relationship switch is not done for Labour Force Survey statistics.

The head of the family is therefore characterized as follows:

- (1) In families consisting of married couples with or without children, the husband is the head;
- (2) In single-parent families with unmarried children, the parent is the head;
- (3) In single-parent families with married children, the member who is mainly responsible for the maintenance of the family becomes the head;
- (4) In families where the relationships are other than husband-wife or parent-child, normally the eldest is considered the head.

Please note that the head of the family is not necessarily the major income recipient. In fact, the head may have received no income at all.

INDIVIDUAL'S PERSONAL CHARACTERISTICS

The following characteristics are determined at the time the individual enters the Labour Force Survey (from December of the reference year to March of the survey year).

The interviewers are instructed not to update Age if the respondent's birthday falls within the six month period he/she is in the Labour Force Survey. Other characteristics may be updated if the interviewer detects a change of status.

EDUCATION LEVEL

Description

This variable gives the highest level of education completed by this individual at the time of his/her entry into the Labour Force Survey (December of the reference year to March of the survey year).

Users should note that the codes do not show definite breaks between completed and uncompleted secondary school education, and between some university and other post-secondary education.

Post-secondary education normally requires high school graduation (or qualification as a mature student). Mature students are included only if they are taking credit courses which can be used towards a degree, certificate or diploma even though it may be taken for "personal interest".

An institution granting an educational degree requiring a secondary school diploma or a pre-university qualifying year for entrance and which grants a diploma, certificate or degree to the student for successful completion of a course is classified as a "University".

Persons whose highest level of training was received from attending private trade schools, private business colleges or adult training programmes will be marked at the highest elementary or secondary school level which they achieved.

ATTENDED SCHOOL IN REFERENCE WEEK

Description

This variable refers to attendance at any type of public or private educational establishment in the reference week. Only credit courses which are counted towards a degree, diploma or certificate are included. Personal interest courses are not included.

A person is considered to be attending a school, college or university if he or she received instruction during reference week or was engaged in other scholastic or academic activities such as doing research towards a degree, diploma or certificate. Employed persons receiving classroom training sponsored by their employer are considered as attending school only if the instruction is given at a public educational institution, such as a university or community college. They are also considered to be attending school:

1. If the person would have been attending school except that he or she was temporarily ill or disabled.
2. If the person is enrolled in school but is on a short vacation within the school year not exceeding 30 days.
3. If the person would have been attending school but did not because of a labour dispute such as a teachers' strike.

Full-time or part-time enrolment normally depends on the number of courses a person is enrolled in. This distinction differs from school to school.

IMMIGRATION STATUS

Description

This variable indicates if the individual was born in Canada (or born outside of Canada of Canadian parents who registered the child as Canadian), and, if not, it gives the period of years since which he/she has been residing in Canada. Persons born in Newfoundland prior to March 31, 1949 are coded Canadian born. For persons who immigrated to Canada more than once, the most recent year of immigration applies.

Because the survey only collects income received while in Canada a complete picture is not given of the income situation of immigrants. For arrivals during reference year part-year income is collected but for arrivals during the survey year only small amounts of family allowances may be present if they have been transferred from another family member during the survey processing.

LABOUR FORCE STATUS (REFERENCE WEEK)

Description

This variable gives the labour force status of the individual during the reference week. The definitions used for these categories are the same as for the Labour Force Survey and have changed from pre-1976 surveys. The labour force comprises the civilian non-institutional population age 15 and over who were employed or unemployed in the reference week.

The employed includes all persons who, during the reference week:

- (a) did any work for pay or profit
- (b) did any unpaid work which contributed directly to the operation of a farm, business or professional practice owned or operated by a related member of the same household
- (c) had a job but were not at work due to:
 - own illness or disability
 - personal or family responsibilities
 - bad weather
 - labour dispute
 - vacation
 - other reason not specified above (excludes persons on lay-off and persons whose job attachment was to a job to start at a definite date in the future)

The unemployed includes those persons who during the reference week:

- (a) were without work, had actively looked for work in the past four weeks (ending with reference week), and were available for work.
- (b) had not actively looked for work in the past four weeks but had been on lay-off for twenty six weeks or less and were available for work. Persons are classified as being on lay-off only when they expect to return to the job from which they were laid off.
- (c) had not actively looked for work in the past four weeks but had a new job to start in four weeks or less from reference week, and were available for work.

LABOUR FORCE STATUS (REFERENCE WEEK) [CONCLUDED]

Description

Persons meeting the following criteria are regarded as available:

- (i) Full-time students seeking part-time work who also met condition (ii) below. Full-time students looking for full-time work are classified as not available for work during the reference week.
- (ii) They reported that there was no reason why they could not take a job in reference week, or, if they could not take a job it was because of "own illness or disability" or "personal or family responsibilities" or "already had a job".

Those not in the labour force include all individuals 15 years of age and over (exclusive of institutional population) who are not classified as employed or unemployed. Members of the Armed Forces are coded not in the labour force.

CLASS OF WORKER (CURRENT OR LAST JOB)

Description

This variable gives the class of worker of this individual as of reference week. For persons who had a job in the reference week, this is the class of their current main job. For persons who were unemployed or not in the labour force in the reference week but had worked within five years prior to reference week, this is the class of their most recent position. Persons who have never worked or have not worked within five years prior to reference week are coded 5 and 6 respectively.

"Paid" includes any person who worked as an employee for an employer. This also includes persons who work for themselves in an incorporated business. Starting with the 1979 tape, an additional group have been included as paid workers. This group contains only the following types of workers:

- (i) Non live-in babysitters and persons who provide services in the parental home of the children for whom they provide care.
- (ii) Persons who do house-cleaning for a number of clients.
- (iii) Handymen, gardeners, and persons who do "odd jobs" who are directed to their various clients by an agency (or other third party) such as the Canada Employment Centres.

NOTE: For Labour Force Survey purposes the above three types of workers are considered as self-employed. This should be taken into account when comparing SCF and LFS estimates. Both LFS and SCF consider persons as "paid workers" when they are employees of an agency providing baby-sitting, house-cleaning, or minor repair and maintenance services as well as all persons who live on the premises of the client for whom they work.

"Self-employed" applies to individuals who work for themselves. These people may or may not have a business, farm or professional practice. Those who do, could have complete ownership or a partnership in the business. However the business must be unincorporated. If the person is in the process of buying the business while operating it, this is considered ownership.

1980 OCCUPATIONAL CLASSIFICATION [CURRENT OR LAST JOB] - 13-GROUPS AND 49-GROUPSDescription

These variables give the occupational classification of the individual according to the Occupational Classification Manual, Census of Canada, 1980, Catalogue No. 12-565E. For persons who had a job in the reference week, this is their current main occupation. For persons who were unemployed or not in the labour force in the reference week but had worked in the last 5 years this is the occupation they had at their most recent job.

The classification of occupations based on the 1980 Standard Occupational Classification was used for the first time on the 1984 file. This set of standards replaces those previously used which were developed for the 1971 Census. The changes between the 1971 and 1980 occupation classification systems are mainly related to managerial occupations. Persons performing managerial functions in the agriculture, retail trade, accommodation, food and beverages, and insurance industries, who are paid workers, are classified as managers in the 1980 occupation classification. Previously, they were coded to occupations such as farmers, sales, service, etc. Changes in other occupations were very minor.

The complete list of codes on the tape is given on the record layout. The 3-digit 1980 Standard Occupational Classification codes are given in brackets as well as the breakdown of the major occupation (2-digit level) groups.

Code 99 "Not applicable" is given to some records on the 49-Groups variable for confidentiality reasons. These records are coded to the applicable occupation groups only on the 13-Groups variable.

TOTAL USUAL HOURS WORKED

Description

The codes in this variable indicate the usual hours which the individual works per week at all jobs. This may differ from the standard work week (such as stipulated in a collective agreement).

For people with varying hours, "usual hours" is the average number of hours worked per week in the previous three weeks including Reference week.

Variable hours applies to those whose work is characterized, for example, by seasonal swings in the number of hours worked per week (e.g. farmers, fishermen), irregular daily schedules (e.g. real estate agents, door-to-door salesmen) etc.

This procedure is also applied for those persons who usually work only certain periods in the month, e.g., they may only work one week each month, and for them this number of hours reflects a monthly average and distinguishes more effectively between full-time work and part-time work.

REASON FOR WORKING LESS THAN 30 HOURS PER WEEK

Description

This variable applies to individuals whose usual weekly hours of work is less than thirty (see preceding variable), and gives their reason for working part-time only.

Code 1: Full-time Job Requiring Less than 30 Hours Per Week. This code applies when there is some legal, institutional or natural impediment which prevents the respondent from working more than 30 hours per week. Examples of occupations in this category would be airline flying staff or transport drivers who are bound by law to restrict themselves to working less than 30 hours per week. Another example would be teachers who are restricted from working more hours because pupils only attend classes half days.

This code also applies to people such as farmers and fishermen who are interviewed in the off-season and report that they worked an average of less than 30 hours in the previous three weeks.

Code 2: Personal or Family Responsibilities. This code applies whenever the reason for working less than 30 hours per week is because the respondent has some ongoing commitment or responsibility to either themselves or their family which does not permit them to hold a job requiring more than 30 hours of work per week.

Some of the reasons which may fall into this category would be: the respondent provides care and supervision for his/her children or looks after sick or invalid parents or other relatives.

Code 3: Going to School. This code applies when the respondent cannot take a job to last more than 30 hours per week because he/she is currently attending an educational institution either full-time or part-time.

Code 4: Could Only Find Part-time Work. This code applies when a respondent indicates that he would have preferred full-time work (more than 30 hours) but was only able to find a job requiring less than 30 hours per week.

Code 5: Did Not Want Full-time Work. This code applies when a respondent has indicated that he or she preferred to take a job which required less than 30 hours per week.

REASON FOR WORKING LESS THAN 30 HOURS PER WEEK [CONCLUDED]

Code 6: Other: This code applies whenever the respondent has a chronic health condition or a disability which prohibits him/her from working more than 30 hours per week. This code also applies if none of the codes 1-5 apply.

Code 7: Not applicable. This individual is not employed, or if employed works 30 or more hours per week usually.

Description

REASON LEFT LAST JOB

Description

For individuals who were not employed in the reference week, but had worked sometime in the last 5 years this variable gives their reason for leaving their last job.

Code 1: Own Illness or Disability. Code 1 applies if a person left or lost a job as the result of his or her own illness or disability, or some health related reason. It also applies to those who were forced to retire because of ill health or some other disability.

It does not apply, however, if the respondent retired from his or her job at the normal retirement age (see code 5).

Code 2: Personal or Family Responsibilities. Code 2 applies if the person lost or left his job because of personal or family responsibilities, such as marriage, pregnancy, a long trip or vacation, a serious illness in the family, raising a family, etc.

Code 3: Going to School. Code 3 applies if the person has left his or her job in order to go back to school. A school can be any type of educational institution such as a high school, university, community college, or private institutions such as Secretarial colleges, hair-dressing schools, auto mechanic schools, etc. or if government sponsored retraining takes place in a school defined above.

Code 4: Lost Job or Laid Off Job (Paid Workers Only). This code applies for a paid worker whose employment ended involuntarily (for example, discharge for cause (fired), plant permanently shut down, company moved, reduction of staff, job came to an end). With the exception of seasonal job loss, the respondent must have no expectation of being recalled by his employer.

Code 4 also applies when the paid worker's job was of a specific time duration. This includes work on a contract nature where the job ended as soon as the contract was fulfilled, as may be the case for some professional athletes, musicians, consultants, and so on.

REASON LEFT LAST JOB [CONCLUDED]

- Code 5: Retired. Most jobs have a normal retirement age of, for example, 65 years. If the respondent left his job at the normal retirement age then Code 5 is used. If, however, the person retired before the normal retirement age for that job due to ill health or disability then Code 1 applies. For retirement for any other reason, such as qualifying for earlier retirement with lower pension (e.g. at age 55 rather than 65), being forced into early retirement by the employer, etc., Code 5 applies.
- Code 6: Other. This code applies if the individual left his/her job because of changing dwelling (for example, moved to another city or moved too far away to go to work at the old job from the new place of residence), because of job dissatisfaction, or other reasons not included in Codes 1-5 above.

- Code 8: Last Worked More Than Five Years Ago
- Code 9: Not applicable

SAMPLE DESIGN AND IMPLICATIONS

The sample employed for the **Survey of Consumer Finances** is the Labour Force Survey sample. This multi-stage stratified clustered probability sample is described in detail in Methodology of the Canadian Labour Force Survey, 1976, Catalogue No. 71-526 and the feature article in The Labour Force, January 1985, Catalogue No. 71-001. For a more general description, see Guide to Labour Force Survey Data, Catalogue No. 71-528.

Briefly, this sample is designed to represent approximately 98% of the population. Excluded population groups are:

1. residents of the Yukon and Northwest Territories
2. residents of Indian reserves
3. residents of military barracks
4. inmates of institutions such as prisons, penitentiaries, jails, reformatories, mental hospitals, TB hospitals, sanatoria, orphanages and homes for the aged.

Because of varying sampling and response ratios each record on the file has a weight attached to it (see positions 10-12). This weighting factor reflects the sample design and incorporates the inverse of the sampling ratio (which varies significantly by geographic area) and differential response rates for households, among other things. For further information on the weighting procedure see Catalogue No. 13-207, as well as Catalogues No. 71-526, 71-528 and the January 1985 issue of Catalogue No. 71-001 mentioned above.

The sample design and weighting procedure have important implications for data use. Each variable on the file must be multiplied by the weight in order to produce valid statistical estimates of population parameters such as means, medians, modes, estimated numbers and aggregates. However, the appropriateness of using these sample survey weights in regression analysis is a complex issue. A useful summary of the issue is presented in DuMouchel and Duncan (1983) "Using Sample Survey Weights in Multiple Regression Analysis of Stratified Samples". *Journal of the American Statistical Association* Volume 78, December 1983, pp 535-543.

Since a multi-stage stratified clustered sample design was employed, standard error estimates based on the usual simple random formula generally underestimate the true standard errors. For an illustration of the differences, see the uncatalogued paper "An Investigation of Variance Estimation in Family Expenditure Surveys". See also the standard errors of average incomes (which estimate the sampling error) published in Survey of Consumer Finance, Catalogues No. 13-207 and 13-208. Standard errors of percentage distributions for individuals and family units by size are published in Catalogue No. 13-207.

The information necessary to estimate the standard errors is not given on this file. Most regression programs are not capable of considering design effects, even if the relevant information were available. However, generalized programs such as SAS, BMDP and SPSS produce coefficients using weighted least squares. The standard errors calculated by SPSS are much too low because the sum of the weights is used for the degrees of freedom. This can be corrected by dividing the weight on each record by the sum of the weights and multiplying by the sample size. This transformation will produce standard errors equivalent to those produced by SAS and BMDP. Specific requests to produce standard errors of estimates can be handled on a cost-recoverable basis. If this procedure is not followed, we suggest that users of regression packages be generally conservative in interpreting measures of statistical significance from these packages - perhaps using a factor of 2-3 to inflate the standard errors produced, since the standard errors in these packages are generally of the simple random type.

For further information on sampling and non-sampling errors associated with the survey, see Catalogue No. 13-207.

COLLECTION AND PROCESSING PROCEDURES

The sample for the Survey of Consumer Finances used two thirds (or approximately 36,000 dwellings) of the April Labour Force Survey sample.

Data Collection and Processing: With the Survey of Consumer Finances being a supplement to the April Labour Force Survey, standard survey operations were carried out by updating the demographic information on all persons in the selected households and asking persons 15 years of age and over questions concerning their labour force activity during the previous week and work experience during the previous year. The interviewers then dropped off questionnaires for these persons requesting the completion of detailed income information for the reference year. During the survey period, the self-enumerated forms were picked up by the enumerator who made at least one more visit to the household. The questionnaires used in this survey are reproduced at the end of this documentation.

The labour force data were processed and edited according to established Labour Force Survey procedures. The income data were manually pre-edited, loaded onto the computer data base and linked with the Labour Force Survey data. The data were then processed through the computer edit system which checks individual records for consistency and completeness.

Response Rate: The income response rate for individuals 15+ was 80.7%. For a more detailed count of the original sample, vacant dwellings, etc., as well as provincial response rates, see Catalogue No. 13-207.

Imputation for Non-response: Income details for income non-respondents were imputed from income respondents (Respondent individuals were used to impute income to the 19.3% non-respondents). For imputation, the set of donor income respondents and income non-respondents were partitioned according to a pre-determined set of variables. A donor was selected from the set of potential donors on a geographically-nearest basis with reported income components transferred to an income non-respondent.

Income Tax Payable is the amount of income tax payable by income respondents and the sum of Federal Tax Payable and Provincial Tax Payable calculated for income non-respondents. Taxes for non-respondents were calculated in accordance with the computations outlined in the T1 General Individual Tax Return form (and the Quebec TPI General Return of Income form for non-respondents in Quebec).

Income After Tax is Total Income minus Income Tax Payable.

PROCEDURES FOR MANUSCRIPT REVIEW

Because of the complexities inherent in data from household surveys, users of these data are advised to consult with the Household Surveys Division prior to publication of the data. A manuscript review service is provided by that Division to assist users. Users of microdata tapes are also advised prior to publishing their research to consult the relevant pages of the tape documentation provided regarding data reliability and the use of small samples.

The subscriber should file with Statistics Canada a copy of published research or other results based on the use of these microdata. The subscriber shall use the following form of accreditation in reference to the microdata:

"This analysis is based on the Statistics Canada microdata tape (Individuals aged 15 and over, with and without income, 1986) which contains data collected in the 1987 Survey of Consumer Finances. All computations on these microdata were done by (name of user organization) and the responsibility for the use and interpretation of these data is entirely that of the author(s)".

The user should distinguish clearly in the manuscript between data derived directly from the tape on the one hand and all added assumptions, adjustments and modifications introduced by him/her on the other. For example, true wage rates cannot be calculated from the data on the tape and the researcher must specify his assumptions (for which the survey does not provide direct evidence) that would make the averages calculated from the tape appropriate proxies for such a variable.

ESTIMATES OBTAINED FROM MICRODATA FILE

The following tables contain counts and aggregate income amounts obtained from this tape by various characteristics and are given for your use in checking computer output from the tape. On microdata files prior to the 1984 income file, individuals with exceptionally high incomes, large income losses from self-employment or unusual characteristics were excluded from the file. As of 1984, records with these conditions have had selected characteristics zeroed out rather than removing them from the file. Counts on the following pages include these records.

We suggest that users not release or analyse data based on a sample of less than 100 records. In fact, due to our procedure of income imputation we feel that a slightly larger minimal sample would be more appropriate. Users employing small samples may wish to consult the **Income and Housing Surveys Section**.
