

INTRODUCTION

This microdata file on household income, the use of facilities and equipment, and expenditures on shelter has been created by linking data collected from the same households for five different surveys. These surveys are:

Household Facilities and Equipment (HFE), May 1988 Labour Force Survey (LFS), April 1988 Survey of Consumer Finances (SCF), April 1988 Rent Survey, April 1988 Shelter Cost Survey (SCS), March 1988

There have been ten previous tapes combining the SCF, HFE, LFS, and the Rent Survey. The SCS was conducted for the first time in March of 1988(1). This survey, as well as the linkage to the HFE file, was funded by CMHC, the provincial governments, and Statistics Canada.

Part 1. Household Income, Facilities and Equipment

This part of the file on household income, facilities and equipment is intended for use in the study of types of facilities in households with relationship to the household's income. For research on income statistics, other microdata tapes are available or special requests for data can be made to Household Surveys Division on a cost recoverable basis. No microdata tapes purely on household facilities are planned at this time.

This is the eleventh selected year for which a microdata tape on household income, facilities and equipment is being released. Tapes are available biennially starting with 1972 and annually since 1982 except for 1984.

⁽¹⁾ A new annual survey conducted for the first time in March 1989 covered only the repair and renovation expenses made by homeowners. If there is sufficient demand, a microdata tape will be released from the survey.

INTRODUCTION (CONTINUED)

Over the years, the basic content and concepts of the HIFE tapes have remained relatively stable. However, following each decennial census, the sample design of the Labour Force Survey is revised to incorporate recent developments in sampling methodology and to reflect population changes indicated by the most recent census data. The latest redesigned sample was implemented in January 1985 to replace the design in use since 1975. For information on the redesign of the Labour Force Survey sample, see the feature article published in **The Labour Force**, **January 1985**, Catalogue No.71-001. A general description only is given in the "Sample Design and Implications" section.

Part 2. Shelter Cost Survey

The Shelter Cost Survey was conducted for the first time in March 1988. The purpose of the survey was to provide detailed data on the expenditures made for utilities, mortgages, taxes, maintenance, and renovations by households on their homes. The sample consisted of the same sample as the HFE plus an additional rotation group. This file contains the common records.

The file contents of Part 2 follow the order of the questionnaire:

- 1. Renter expenses
- 2. Dwelling owned and occupied at the time of the survey:
 - a) Mortgage information
 - b) Taxes and utilities
 - c) Additions, renovations, maintenance, etc.
- 3. Other dwellings owned and occupied in 1987:
 - a) Additions, renovations, maintenance, etc.

INTRODUCTION (CONTINUED)

Users of this tape should be aware of the following points:

- 1. All distributions, estimated numbers and amounts, averages, etc. must be produced using weighted values and not sample counts. For a description of the weighting factor (in position 10-14 of each record) and its use see the item description "Final Universal Weight" and "Sample Design and Implications" in this documentation.
- 2. Any estimates or percentage distributions to be published or analysed from this data set should be based on a sample of at least 100 records. This is the policy followed in our publications and is based on the fact that data produced from smaller samples is unlikely to be reliable. The purchaser of this tape is invited to submit his final manuscript(s) to the manuscript review service offered by the Division. For further information on this procedure see "Procedures for Manuscript Review" of this documentation. In the text of such manuscripts the source should be described as follows: "The analysis done for this report is based on the Statistics Canada microdata tape "Household Income (1987), Facilities and Equipment, 1988, Shelter Cost (1987)" which contains data collected with the 1988 Survey of Household Facilities and Equipment, the 1988 Survey of Consumer Finances and the 1987 Shelter Cost Survey. All computations on this data base were done by (name of user organization)". If this is the only source of data in the report, it is not necessary to source each table as well. However, if there are other sources, the tables should be individually sourced. In accordance with the development of standard referencing for machine-readable data file¹, we recommend the following wording be used in bibliographies:

Statistics Canada. Household Income (1987), Facilities and Equipment, 1988, Shelter Cost (1987) [machine-readable data file]. 1989 Edition. Ottawa, Ontario: Household Surveys Division [producer and distributor]. One data file (33,070 logical records) and accompanying documentation.

INTRODUCTION (CONCLUDED)

- 3. Determination of who is the household head is based on relationships only. The head is not necessarily the major earner or income recipient and may, in fact, have no income at all.
- 4. The term "reference year" refers to 1987 wherever it appears in this documentation.
- 5. The term "survey year" refers to 1988 wherever it appears in this documentation.
- 6. The term "reference week" refers to the week of April 10 to 16, 1988, the week immediately preceding the two-week period when the Survey of Consumer Finances was conducted.

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NOTES FOR USERS OF HISTORICAL SERIES OF HIFE TAPES

The majority of SCF/HFE concepts have remained unchanged since the 1971 household income file (1972 facilities and equipment). However, in addition to the changes described in Section B the following points summarize some changes in concepts which may help to explain certain statistical results.

- 1. From a methodological point of view, 2 important changes occurred beginning with the 1987 income file (1988 facilities and equipment)
 - (i) The weighting factor is a 100% weight. On previous files, a 10% weight was used. The factor length increased to five bytes from three bytes. In addition, a new integrated weighting procedure is used for the first time on the 1987 income file (1988 facilities and equipment). This single weighting procedure replaces the previous procedure of separate weighting programs for economic families, census families, individuals and households. The result is that the same weight is given to all individuals and family units within a household. Previously, individuals and families within sample households could have different weights.
 - (ii) The estimated numbers of household units used to derive weights for the 1987 income file (1988 facilities and equipment) have been re-based to 1986 Census counts corresponding to the Labour Force Survey coverage. This affects to some degree the comparability of estimates produced from earlier tapes. For further details see the section on "Weighting" in catalogue 13-207, "Income Distributions by Size in Canada, 1987".
- 2. Beginning with the 1987 income file (1988 facilities and equipment), the income concept has been expanded to include the federal Sales Tax Credit claimed at income tax time. This change has a slight effect on other variables such as Total Income and Income After Tax.

NOTES FOR USERS OF HISTORICAL SERIES OF HIFE TAPES (CONTINUED)

- 3. Beginning with the 1987 income file (1988 facilities and equipment), the size of area variable (position 8) was based on 1986 Census population counts within 1981 boundaries. Previously, it was based on 1961 populations (1971 and 1973 income, 1972 and 1974 facilities and equipment files), 1971 populations (1975-79 income, 1976-80 facilities and equipment files), 1976 populations within 1971 boundaries (1981 and 1982 income, 1982 and 1983 facilities and equipment files) and 1981 Census population within 1981 boundaries (1984 to 1986 income, 1985 to 1987 facilities and equipment files). The procedure of recoding unique centres was somewhat revised beginning with the 1984 income, 1985 facilities and equipment file, to provide less distortion in size of area groupings (see "Area").
- 4. For the 1987 income file (1988 facilities and equipment), households in an augmented sample in Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island were included along with the regular four rotation sample of the Labour Force Survey.
- 5. Beginning with the 1987 income file (1988 facilities and equipment), following revision of the low income cut-offs on the basis of 1986 Family Expenditure data, the 1986 based low income code for the economic family is provided on the tape.
- 6. Beginning with the 1986 income file (1987 facilities and equipment), all variables concerning number of household/family persons (e.g. number of earners, number of children, etc.) contain actual number of persons. On the 1984 and 1985 income files (1985 and 1986 facilities and equipment) these variables were given upper limits.
- 7. Beginning with the 1985 income file (1986 facilities and equipment), dollar fields were increased from 7 to 8 bytes.
- 8. Beginning with the 1984 income file (1985 facilities and equipment), the Classification of Occupations based on the 1980 Standard Occupational Classification was used for the first time.

NOTES FOR USERS OF HISTORICAL SERIES OF HIFE TAPES (CONTINUED)

- 9. On microdata files prior to the 1984 income file (1985 facilities and equipment), family units with exceptionally high incomes, large income losses from self-employment or unusual characteristics were excluded from the file. Beginning with the 1984 income file, records with these conditions have had selected characteristics zeroed-out rather than removing these records from the file. Variables which have been masked have been indicated on the record layout as "Special Family Units". Control counts given in "Estimates Obtained from Microdata File" include these records.
- 10. Beginning with the 1981 income file (1982 facilities and equipment), the income concept has been expanded to include the federal Child Tax Credit and refundable provincial tax credits claimed at income tax time. This change has affected several variables other than Total Income and Income After Tax.
- 11. Beginning with the 1981 income file (1982 facilities and equipment), following revision of the low income cut-offs on the basis of 1978 Family Expenditure data, the 1978 based low income code for the economic family is provided on the tape.
- 12. Beginning with the 1981 income file (1982 facilities and equipment), the cut-off for "full-time worker" has been changed to 49 weeks from 50, to conform with Census practices.
- 13. Beginning with the 1979 income file (1980 facilities and equipment), Class of Worker coding was modified, so that certain types of LFS self-employed persons are classified as paid workers for SCF purposes.
- 14. Beginning with 1977 income file (1978 facilities and equipment), Total Net Income from Self-Employment and Total Earnings include Net Income from Roomers and Boarders. The Number of Earners variable has always included Room and Board Income recipients. The effect of this change is minimal.

NOTES FOR USERS OF HISTORICAL SERIES OF HIFE TAPES (CONCLUDED)

- 15. Beginning with the 1975 income file (1976 facilities and equipment), Family and Youth Allowances have been reported by the person who claimed a personal tax exemption for the children for when the allowance was paid. Prior to 1975, the male parent or guardian reported the allowances.
- 16. Beginning with the 1975 income file (1976 facilities and equipment), the classification system for education level of the head and wife changed. For the 1971 and 1973 income files (1972 and 1974 facilities and equipment) the codes specifically separated "high school completed" from "high school not completed" and divided post-secondary into university and non-university. For the 1975 income file (1976 facilities and equipment), and later years it is not possible to obtain a category "completed high school" as 11-13 years includes some completed and some not. Also post-secondary only indicates university level if a degree was received.
- 17. Beginning with the 1975 income file (1976 facilities and equipment), the Labour Force Status coding definitions changed when the Revised Labour Force Survey went into effect.

NOTES FOR PART 2, SHELTER COST

INCONSISTENCIES BETWEEN THE HFE AND THE SCS

Although the five surveys used for this tape were administered to members of the same dwelling, there are inconsistencies in some of the records.

Some of these inconsistencies are valid. For example, if the household that was interviewed in March was not the same as the one in the dwelling in May, differences in tenure could easily arise. In other situations the tenure of the same household could have changed.

However, the main cause of the inconsistencies is the result of response error. The response error is due to the interviewers' and the respondents' misinterpretation of questions, or the respondents' faulty reporting. For example, the responding member of the household in March may have been different than the one in May. One respondent could have thought that there was a mortgage on the dwelling while the other thought not.

Processing error likely had little effect. Many questionnaires of captured records having inconsistencies were examined. Less than 1% of these showed that there were errors in data capture to the computer files.

NOTES FOR PART 2, SHELTER COST (CONCLUDED)

THE EFFECT OF LARGE VALUES IN THE SHELTER COST SURVEY

In any sample the averages and distributions can be affected by the presence and absence of extreme values. These are more likely to arise from highly positively skewed populations. The nature of the additions, renovations, alterations and repair data lends itself to such extreme values.

The level of detail in the SCS is there to act as building blocks to aggregates. The low frequency of reported expenditures for many of the subcomponents results in highly variable estimates. For this reason, the detail subcomponents are not on the file.

The group totals on the file are also influenced by large values. For the "Present Dwelling" fields, the highest ten for total "Additions" contributed 11%; for "Renovation" 8%; for "Replacements" 10%; 12% for "New Installations"; and 5% for "Repairs and Maintenance". These are all smaller than all their corresponding subcomponents. Similarly, the highest ten for the sum of "Additions, Renovations and New Installations" contribute 5% to its total and those for the sum of "Replacements and Repair and Maintenance" contributed 2% to its total.

In contrast to the improvements and repair questions, the highest 10 values for the five utility questions contributed between 0.8% and 3%.

AREA

Description

This variable indicates the population size of the area in which the surveyed unit is located. Population figures used to classify this variable were obtained from the 1986 Census and apply to the population covered by the Labour Force Survey within 1981 Census boundaries to conform with the sample design.

In five cases where urban centres are unique in a given area category for their province, they have been placed in another category. One centre, Halifax has been moved down one category. St. John's, which was unique in the next lower category, was moved down two categories. Victoria and Fredericton were moved up one category. Brandon was moved up two categories.

FINAL UNIVERSAL WEIGHT

Description

This is a five-digit variable which is computed to provide weights to inflate the sample to pre-determined household totals. The weight must be used to produce valid statistics from this tape.

However, all estimated numbers and aggregates obtained from this survey should be treated as only approximate. The reliability of the survey's estimates depends on the quality of independent household estimates used to determine the weights. Sampling errors are another factor in determining data quality. REVISED (1991 CENSUS) WEIGHT

This microdata file contains a revised weight ("Revised 1991 census weight") in positions 10-14. The revision reflects the move to the 1991 census base, the adjustment of population estimates for net census undercoverage, and the inclusion of non-permanent residents. This weight replaces the one originally released on the file which was based on 1986 census population projections.

The "Weighted and Sample Counts for Income Variables" on pages 133 to 156 were originally included in this documentation for verification of outputs created from this file. The "sample count" values are not affected by the revision. The "weighted count"/"total weighted value" were derived from the original weights in position 10-14 and therefore are not comparable to weighted values obtained from the file. For verification of revised weighted values, a set of select estimates based on the revised weight are included on page 157.

HOUSEHOLD NUMBER OF PERSONS

Description This variable gives the actual number of persons in the household.

HOUSEHOLD NUMBER OF ADULTS

Description

This variable gives the actual number of adults in the household. The head of the household is an adult, as well as heads of economic families within the household and any other member of the household who is married or has been married, and any single person 16 years of age or over.

HOUSEHOLD NUMBER OF PERSONS AGED 65 OR OVER

Description This variable gives the actual number of persons aged 65 years or more in the household.

HOUSEHOLD NUMBER OF EARNERS

Description

This variable gives the actual number of persons in the household who received income from wages, salaries, military pay and allowances, self-employment (farm and non-farm) and/or roomers and boarders.

HOUSEHOLD NUMBER OF PERSONS WITH INCOME

Description

This variable gives the actual number of persons in the household who received income from any of the sources collected in the survey.

WAGES AND SALARIES

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household on account of wages and salaries from all types of civilian employment.

Included are gross cash wages and salaries received during the reference year from all jobs, before deductions for pension funds, hospital insurance, income taxes, Canada Savings Bonds, etc. Tips of such employees as waiters and porters, earnings of farm labourers, cleaning women, newspaper boys and baby-sitters as well as net commissions (gross commissions less expenses) of a salesperson who worked for only one company at a time and did not pay for his/her own office and staff are included here.

The value of taxable allowances and benefits provided by the employers, such as free lodging, bursaries, travelling expenses, etc. are not included.

The wages and salaries reported should amount to the "total earnings before deductions" as shown in box $\mathbb C$ of the T-4 slips less the value of "taxable allowances and benefits" shown in box $\mathbb K$ to $\mathbb Q$ plus tips and gratuities and casual earnings for which no T-4 slips were provided. This variable is always positive.

MILITARY PAY AND ALLOWANCES

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household on account of service as a regular member of the Armed Forces of Canada or as a member of a reserve unit, as well as payment to dependents of such servicemen. Special benefits paid upon discharge are also included.

This variable is always positive.

Source

NET INCOME FROM NON-FARM SELF-EMPLOYMENT

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household on account of various types of non-farm self-employment activities.

Self-employment income is defined as that income received as a result of being a partner in, or sole owner of, an unincorporated business or professional practice. Only the individual's share of net income is included in the case of partnerships. A salesperson who has his/her own office or staff, or who works for more than one firm at a time, reports income under self-employment. Net income is calculated by deducting operating expenses (wages, rent, interest payments, etc.) and depreciation costs from the gross revenue of the business. Items of a capital nature (e.g. investment in new buildings) are excluded from expenses.

Income received from businesses which have corporate status is reported as wages and salaries or as dividends (under investment income).

This variable may be positive, indicating a business profit, or negative, indicating a loss.

NET INCOME FROM FARM SELF-EMPLOYMENT

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household on account of net income from farm self-employment.

Net income from farming is calculated by deducting operating expenses (wages, rent, interest payments, etc.) and depreciation costs from the gross revenue of the farm. Items of a capital nature (e.g. investment in new buildings) are excluded from expenses. Government supplementary payments are included in gross revenue. The value of income in kind is not included. In the case of partnerships, only the individual's share of net income is included.

Income from farms which have a corporate status is recorded as wages and salaries or dividends, not self-employment income.

This variable may be positive, indicating profits, or negative, indicating losses.

NET INCOME FROM ROOMERS AND BOARDERS

Description

This variable gives the sum of net income from roomers and boarders reported by all individuals in the household. Payments of room and board from relatives are not included.

This variable is always positive.

Source

TOTAL NET INCOME FROM SELF-EMPLOYMENT

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household on account of net income from self-employment (both farm and non-farm) and net income from roomers and boarders. It equals the sum of the three previous variables.

This variable may be positive or negative.

Source

TOTAL EARNINGS

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported on account of wages and salaries, military pay and allowances, net income from both farm and non-farm self-employment and net income from roomers and boarders.

This variable is given separately on this tape for the household, primary economic family, head and spouse.

This variable may be positive or negative.

Source

TOTAL INVESTMENT INCOME

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household on account of investment income.

This variable is given separately on this tape for the household and the primary economic family.

This source of income includes interest received on bonds, deposits and savings certificates from Canadian or foreign sources, dividends received from Canadian and foreign corporate stocks, cash dividends received from insurance policies, net rental income from real estate and farms, interest received on loans and mortgages, regular income from an estate or trust fund and other investment income.

This variable may be positive or negative.

FAMILY AND YOUTH ALLOWANCES

Description

This variable gives the amount received by the household on account of Federal and Provincial family and youth allowances. The Provincial program included is for Quebec.

The amount of family and youth allowances received is reported by the person who claimed a personal tax exemption for the child(ren) for whom the allowance was paid. If neither parent (or guardian) claimed an exemption for the child(ren), the person to whom the cheque was made out was to report the payments.

Family allowances were assigned to some families because the amounts they reported did not fall within limits defined by the number and ages of children in the family at the time of the survey and the province of residence.

This variable is always positive.

Source

CHILD TAX CREDIT

Description

This variable gives the amount of the Child Tax Credit as claimed on the I1 Schedule 10 (if a Child Tax Credit Prepayment was received) or on the I1-General or the I1-Special Individual Income Tax Return (if a Prepayment was not received). This amount was to be reported on the survey questionnaire by the person who received the Family Allowance payment in December of the reference year (usually the female parent). If tax credits were this person's only source of income, the amount was transferred to the spouse. (Family Allowance payments, however, are reported by the person who claimed the children for a tax deduction.)

It should be noted that the tax credit amount reported is for the reference year. This amount may have been received in cash (in the survey year as well as during the reference year for any Prepayment amounts) or may have only resulted in a reduction in total income tax paid.

This variable is always positive.

OLD AGE SECURITY, GUARANTEED INCOME SUPPLEMENT AND SPOUSE'S ALLOWANCE

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts received by all individuals 65 years of age and over in the household on account of Old Age Security Pensions and the Guaranteed Income Supplement and the eligible spouses age 60-65 who received Spouses' Allowances. Supplements from provincial governments are included in "Social Assistance and Provincial Income Supplements".

This variable is always positive.

Source

CANADA/QUEBEC PENSION PLAN BENEFITS

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household as benefits received under the Canada/Quebec Pension Plan.

This includes retirement pensions, survivor's benefits such as widow's pensions, disabled widower's pensions, orphan's benefits, and disability pensions with benefits for dependent children of disability pensioners. Lump sum death benefits received under these plans are not included.

This variable is always positive.

Source

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (UIC) BENEFITS

Description

This variable gives the sum of the amounts reported by all individuals in the household on account of the Unemployment Insurance scheme. This should equal the amount from the "Total Benefits" box of the T-4U Income Tax slip and includes benefits for sickness, maternity, work-sharing, retraining and retirement. Benefits paid to self-employed fishermen are also included.

This variable is always positive.

Source

SOCIAL ASSISTANCE AND PROVINCIAL INCOME SUPPLEMENTS

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals in the household as received for social assistance from provincial or municipal governments. Also included are payments received from provincial income supplement programs.

Benefits include assistance to needy mothers with dependent children, to the blind and disabled as well as other cash payments to any persons in need.

This variable is always positive.

Source

OTHER INCOME FROM GOVERNMENT SOURCES

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported by all individuals on account of all other payments received from federal, provincial or municipal governments not reported in previous variable fields. It also includes refundable provincial tax credits and the federal Sale Tax Credit as claimed on Individual Income Tax Return forms.

Examples of payments included are veteran's pensions, pensions to widows and dependents of veterans, civilian war allowances, worker's compensation, payments received from training programs sponsored by the federal and provincial governments, Quebec Work Assistance programs, Quebec Maternity Allowance, regular payments received from provincial automobile insurance plans and provincial grants for home ownership promotion, mortgage interest rate reduction and property improvement.

Refundable provincial tax credits included are the amounts claimed on the Individual Income Tax Returns under "Summary of Tax and Credits" for Ontario and Manitoba. Quebec's Real Estate Tax Refund as claimed on Schedule B and Quebec Allowance for Children Under 6 years of age are also included. These amounts may have been received in cash (probably in the survey year) or may have resulted in a reduction in total income tax payable.

This variable is always positive.

NOTE:

1987 was the first year that federal Sales Tax Credit was included in Other Income From Government Services.

TOTAL GOVERNMENT TRANSFER PAYMENTS

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts received by all individuals on account of Family and Youth Allowances, Old Age Security pensions and Guaranteed Income Supplement, Canada/Quebec Pension Plan benefits, Unemployment Insurance, Child Tax Credit, Provincial Tax Credits and federal Sales Tax Credit, social assistance and other government transfer payments. It equals the sum of the seven variables preceding it on the record layout.

This variable is given separately on this tape for the household, primary economic family, head and spouse.

This variable will always be positive.

Source

NOTE:

1987 was the first year that federal Sales Tax Credit was included in Total Government Transfer Payments.

TAXABLE GOVERNMENT TRANSFER PAYMENTS

Description

This variable gives the sum of amounts reported as receipts from government transfer programs which are taxable. This amount is calculated during the survey processing, not reported by individuals as the amounts reported on their Individual Tax Returns. This variable should be used with this in mind and any reports or publications derived from this tape using this variable should mention our reservations about its use.

The following amounts were included:

- 1. Family and Youth Allowances all amounts;

REPAIRS NEEDED

Description

This variable indicates the respondent's evaluation of the repairs the dwelling needs to restore it to its original condition. Desirable remodelling, additions, conversions, or energy improvements which would upgrade the dwelling over and above its original condition are not included.

 $\underline{\text{Major repairs}}$ include serious deficiencies in the structural condition of the dwelling, as well as in the plumbing, electrical and heating systems. Examples include corroded pipes, damaged electrical wiring, sagging floors, bulging walls, damp walls and ceilings, crumbling foundation, etc.

Minor repairs include deficiencies in the surface or covering material of the dwelling and less serious deficiencies in the plumbing, electrical and heating systems. Examples include small cracks in interior walls and ceilings, broken light fixtures and switches, cracked or broken window panes, leaking sink, missing shingles or siding, peeling paint, etc.

Regular maintenance includes painting, fixing leaking faucets, clogged gutters or eaves troughs, etc.

YEAR HEAD MOVED INTO DWELLING

Description

This item refers to the year the head of the household moved into the dwelling. <u>The date of the actual move</u> and not the date on which the accommodation was acquired either through purchase or a lease arrangement was to be considered. Thus, if the head of the household bought a house in July 1982 but did not move until March 1983, the 1983 circle would be marked.

If the head of the household moved from the upper floor to the first floor unit of a duplex any time since January 1983, this was considered a move. If the head of the household moved into his/her relative's house (e.g. at the time of marriage, etc.) since January 1983 and is now the head, this was also considered a move.

In cases where the dwelling was converted from single to multiple units this was <u>not</u> considered a "move", as the head of the household was still occupying a part of it.

Exception:

In families where spouses moved in on different dates, the <u>earliest</u> move determined the applicable category for this item. For example: Mary K. moved into this apartment in July 1982. Her husband, Major Jack K., moved in during September 1983 after completing his latest tour of duty in Cyprus. In this case, the "before 1983" category would be coded.

TENURE OF PREVIOUS DWELLING

Description

This variable was to be coded owned or rented only if the household head or spouse (or former spouse) owned or rented the previous dwelling. If another household member was the owner or renter, "did not maintain own dwelling" was to be coded. This latter category, therefore was intended to indentify new, recently formed households. Examples which fall into this category include situations such as: head (and spouse) lived before with parents and/or with more distant relatives who owned or rented the dwelling; head lived as a roomer in a boarding house, or in a collective or a communal residence (army barracks, lumber camp, university residence) or as a resident of any type of institution.

A dwelling may have been <u>rented</u> even though no cash was paid. For example, the janitor of an apartment building whose apartment is supplied as part of his salary is considered to be renting the dwelling.

HOUSEHOLD HEAD

Description

A household is a person or group of persons occupying a dwelling unit. The head of the household is always the head of the primary economic family. In single unit households consisting of a married couple with or without children the husband is the head; for single-parent families with unmarried children the parent is the head; for single-parent families with married children, the member who is mainly responsible for the maintenance of the family becomes the head and in families where relationships are other than husband-wife or parent-child the eldest in the family is usually considered the head. An unattached individual living alone in a dwelling is the head of his/her own household. In multi-unit households, the head of the primary economic family unit becomes the head of the household (as opposed to the heads of units who are rooming, sharing the dwelling or residing there as employees-domestics).

HEAD (SPOUSE): CLASS OF WORKER (CURRENT OR LAST JOB)

Description

This variable gives the class of worker of this individual as of reference week. For persons who had a job in the reference week, this is the class of their current main job. For persons who were unemployed or not in the labour force in the reference week but had worked within five years prior to reference week, this is the class of their most recent position. Persons who have never worked or have not worked within five years prior to reference week are coded 4 and 5 respectively.

"Paid" includes any person who worked as an employee for an employer. This also includes persons who work for themselves in an incorporated business. Starting with the 1979 tape, an additional group have been included as paid workers. This group contains only the following types of workers:

- (i) Non live-in babysitters and persons who provide services in the parental home of the children for whom they provide care.
- (ii) Persons who do house-cleaning for a number of clients.
- (iii) Handymen, gardeners, and persons who do "odd jobs" who are directed to their various clients by an agency (or other third party) such as the Canada Employment Centres.

Description

These variables give the occupational classification of the individual according to the Occupational Classification Manual, Census of Canada, 1980, Catalogue No. 12-565E. For persons who had a job in the reference week, this is their current main occupation. For persons who were unemployed or not in the labour force in the reference week but had worked in the last 5 years this is the occupation they had at their most recent job.

The classification of occupations based on the 1980 Standard Occupational Classification was used for the first time on the 1984 file. This set of standards replaces those previously used which were developed for the 1971 Census. The changes between the 1971 and 1980 occupation classification systems are mainly related to managerial occupations. Persons performing managerial functions in the agriculture, retail trade, accommodation, food and beverages, and insurance industries, who are paid workers, are classified as managers in the 1980 occupation classification. Previously, they were coded to occupations such as farmers, sales, service, etc. Changes in other occupations were very minor.

The complete list of codes on the tape is given on the record layout. The 3-digit 1980 Standard Occupational Classification codes are given in brackets as well as the breakdown of the major occupation (2-digit level) groups.

Code 99 "Not applicable" is given to some records on the 49-Groups variable for confidentiality reasons. These records are coded to the applicable occupation groups only on the 13-Groups variable.

This variable gives the actual number of weeks in which the individual did any work during the reference year.

Included as weeks worked are:

- (b) the number of weeks the person had a job but was not at work due to holidays, vacation, illness, maternity leave, strike or lock-out;
- (c) the number of weeks a person was self-employed;

These are not necessarily complete weeks for which the individual was paid. School teachers under contract to teach the full school year during the reference year are coded 52 weeks even if they did not teach or did other work during the summer. These 1978 base low income limits reflect more recent consumption patterns of Canadian families. As the overall ratio spent on food, shelter and clothing had declined since 1969, families who on average spent 58.5% or more of their income on this type of goods and services were considered to be in straitened circumstances.

RENT DATA

The following rent information applies only to non-farm rented dwellings with type of dwelling code = 1-5. This means that the following types of rented dwellings have "not applicable" codes for this section of data:

- 3. rented dwellings in locations defined as special areas according to the LFS sample design. These are principally remote areas.

Users of these data interested in doing rent to income studies should be aware of the following problem. The rent collected applies to April of the survey year. Multiplying by 12 to get an annual value requires certain assumptions which do not hold for all households. The household membership also refers to April of the survey year. The income data refers to the calendar year (reference year). As a result, any income for members present in the reference year who were not present in April of the survey year is not included in the household total. Similarly, unattached individuals renting in April may have been household members during the reference year with little or no income.

RENT SUBSIDIZED

Description

A rent is considered to be subsidized when the tenant pays less than the amount normally charged for the dwelling. Subsidization here is financial aid paid directly to the landlord of the dwelling. Financial aid which is paid to the tenant (even if it is meant to help with the rent) is not considered here as a subsidy.

SAMPLE DESIGN AND IMPLICATIONS

The HFE Survey was a supplement to the May 1988 LFS. The Shelter Cost Survey was a March 1988 supplement. The other three surveys were conducted simultaneously in April 1988. The sample employed for these surveys is the Labour Force Survey sample, which is a multi-stage stratified clustered probability sample.

Briefly, this sample is designed to represent approximately 98% of the population. Excluded population groups are:

- 1. Residents of the Yukon and Northwest Territories
- 2. Residents of Indian Reserves
- 3. Residents of military barracks
- 4. Inmates of institutions such as prisons, penitentiaries, jails, reformatories, mental hospitals, TB hospitals, sanitoria, orphanages and homes for the aged.

In addition, households living in collective-type dwellings such as hotels, large lodging houses, clubs, logging and construction camps are excluded from this file.

SAMPLE DESIGN AND IMPLICATIONS (CONCLUDED)

Because of varying sampling and response rates each record on the file has a weight attached to it. This weighting factor reflects the sample design and incorporates the inverse of the sampling ratio (which varies significantly by geographic area) and differential response rates for households, among other things. For further information on the weighting procedure see Catalogue No. 13-207, and "HIFE Final Household Weight" of this documentation.

The sample design and weighting procedure have important implications for data use. Each variable on the file must be multiplied by the weight in order to produce valid statistical estimates of population parameters such as means, medians, modes, estimated numbers and aggregates. However, the appropriateness of using these sample survey weights in regression analysis is another issue. A useful summary of this issue is presented in DuMouchel and Duncan (1983) "Using Sample Survey Weights in Multiple Regression Analysis of Stratified Samples". Journal of American Statistical Association Volume 78, December 1983, pp 535-543.

The information necessary to estimate the standard errors is not given on this file. Most regression programs are not capable of considering design effects, even if the relevant information were available. However, generalized programs such as SAS, BMDP and SPSS produce coefficients using weighted least squares. The standard errors calculated by SPSS are much too low because the sum of the weights is used for the degrees of freedom. This can be corrected by dividing the weight on each record by the sum of the weights and multiplying by the sample size. This transformation will produce standard errors equivalent to those produced by SAS and BMDP. Specific requests to produce standard errors of estimates can also be handled on a cost-recoverable basis.

Secondly, standard errors calculated for these data using the formula for data from simple random samples may be very misleading. Sampling errors calculated from this sample design are generally higher than those using the sample random formula. As an illustration of their magnitude, see the standard error symbols published in Catalogue No. 62-202, as well as the standard error of average incomes (which estimate the sampling error) published in Catalogue No. 13-567. For information on standard errors of more complex analytic statistics (i.e. regression estimates) see the uncatalogued paper "An Investigation of Variance Estimation in Family Expenditure Surveys" and associated bibliography.

For further information on sampling and non-sampling errors associated with the survey, see Catalogue Nos. 13-218, 64-202 and 13-207.

PROCEDURES FOR MANUSCRIPT REVIEW

Because of the complexities inherent in data from household surveys, users of these data are advised to consult with the Household Surveys Division prior to publication of the data. A manuscript review service is provided by the Division to assist users. Users of microdata tapes are also advised prior to publishing their research to consult the relevant pages of the tape documentation provided regarding data reliability and the use of small samples.

The subscriber should file with Statistics Canada a copy of published research or other results based on the use of these microdata. The subscriber shall use the following form of accreditation in reference to the microdata:

"This analysis is based on the Statistics Canada microdata tape (Household Income (1987), Facilities and Equipment, 1988, Shelter Cost, 1987) which contains data collected in the (Survey of Consumer Finances, 1988, Survey of Household Facilities and Equipment, 1988, Shelter Cost Survey, 1987). All computations on these microdata were done by (name of user organization) and the responsibility for the use and interpretation of these data is entirely that of the author(s)".

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The user should distinguish clearly in the manuscript between data derived directly from the tape on the one hand and all added assumptions, adjustments and modifications introduced by him/her on the other. For example, true wage rates cannot be calculated from the data on the tape and the researcher must specify his assumptions (for which the survey does not provide direct evidence) that would make the averages calculated from the tape appropriate proxies for such a variable.

ESTIMATES OBTAINED FROM MICRODATA FILE

The following pages contain counts obtained from this tape and are given for your use in checking computer output from the tape. On microdata files prior to the 1984 household income file (1985 facilities and equipment), households with exceptionally high incomes, large income losses from self-employment or unusual characteristics were excluded from the file. As of 1984, records with these conditions have had selected characteristics zeroed out rather than removing them from the file. Counts on the following pages include these records.

We suggest that users not release or analyse data based on a sample of less than 100 records. In fact, due to our procedure of income imputation we feel that a slightly larger minimal sample would be more appropriate. Users employing small samples may wish to consult the **Income and Housing Surveys Section**.

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


